East Hartford High School "Hornets" Basketball Team

Whereas the six Senior Hornets – Austin Nwafor, Justin Nwafor, Rafael Cruz Alderson, Jaden Oliveras, Aaron Tomlinson and Kingsley Cockburn – will be attending college in the fall; and

Whereas Isaiah Williams, Kingsley Cockburn and Justin Nwafor were named All Conference players – the most by any team in the Central Connecticut Conference; and

East Hartford Fire Department: Climb for Air

Whereas the American Lung Association has held " Climbs" in prominent skyscrapers, stadiums or arenas, involving walking, running or racing up hundreds of steps all over the country; and

Whereas these climbs are sometimes called a "vertical road race" in which teams use the event as a fitness target; and

Whereas such climbs raise awareness of lung conditions, such as asthma and other illnesses associated with lungs; and

Whereas this climb also raises funding for critical research; and

Whereas the American Lung Association of New England's 10th Air Climb was held on April 22, 2017 at HARTFORD 21; and

Whereas East Hartford Firefighters who participated in this climb were Chris Goglia, Eric Ramsay, Duane Maranda, Matthew Hinman, Jeffrey Demarest, Steven Purcell, Dan Macdonald and Mike Transue; and

Whereas the 5 best time records of those firefighters resulted in an overall average finishing time of 7 minutes 18 seconds - securing 1st place for a Fire Department Team for the climb involving over 400 other firefighter participants; and

Whereas Chris Goglia secured the fastest time record within his age group; and

Whereas Eric Ramsay secured the 2nd fastest time record within his age group.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the East Hartford Town Council, along with Mayor Marcia Leclerc, recognizes and acknowledges the honor that these achievements brought to the Town of East Hartford and the East Hartford Fire Department and extends it appreciation for the professionalism of the East Hartford Fire Department and our firefighters' commitment to charitable works.

Joy Morse, Development Director for the American Lung Association, presented the trophy to Fire Chief John Oates and Mayor Leclerc. She congratulated the EHFD for a job well done.

OPPORTUNITY FOR RESIDENTS TO ADDRESS THE COUNCIL ON AGENDA ITEMS

Susan Kniep, 50 Olde Roberts Street, (1) shared with the Council a summary of the municipal aid cuts as suggested by Governor Malloy's revised budget; (2) asked that the Council contact the state legislative delegation for the impact the state budget will have on East Hartford; (3) believes that the Hartford East lease addendum should not be approved; and (4) suggested the town use CDBG monies for roads and sidewalks.

Mayor Leclerc commented on the following: (1) CDBG monies cannot be used for road maintenance, but could be used for sidewalk projects; (2) the Hartford East lease addendum is required for refinancing, which monies will be used for improvements and repairs to the building at 886 Main Street; (3) Tim Bockus will be speaking on Public Works Week; (4) the road improvement program will be starting this summer, which will include 22 roads for repaving/repair; (5) EHPD Officer Marc Caruso has been named Officer of the Year –the ceremony will be Thursday May 18th at the Aqua Turf; (6) the finished tennis courts at EHHS look wonderful and are a big improvement to the tennis teams; (7) WFSB's 20 Towns in 20 Days aired the East Hartford segment from Mickey's Drive-In Restaurant on Pitkin Street; (8) Raymond Library received a \$12,000 grant from Clarcor Engine Mobile Group which will be used to supplement technology programs that are geared toward children; (9) Sarah Morgan, Library Director, is working with the East Hartford Public Schools to promote the summer reading program; (10) the Summer Pop Series will begin on Saturday May 27th at Great River Park; (11) Key Bank has volunteered to clean up Martin Park on Wednesday May 25th; (12) the Parks & Recreation Department will join with the Hockanum River Commission for National Trails Day on Saturday June 3rd at Martin Park; and (13) mosquito treatments have begun in certain areas of town.

COMMUNICATIONS AND PETITIONS

National Public Works Week

Tim Bockus, Public Works Director, informed the Council that next week – May 22nd through May 26th – is National Public Works Week. He invited the Council and all citizens

to the open house at 61 Ecology Drive on Wednesday May 24th to see first-hand what the department's duties are and the employees who carry out those duties.

East Hartford Housing Authority (EHHA) Update

James Kate, Chair of the Board of Directors for the EHHA, and Attorney Ralph Alexander, Legal Counsel for the EHHA, gave a brief presentation to the Council which highlighted on-going projects and the accomplishments of the Authority. Included in that presentation were the following: (1) Larson Center – currently negotiating a 99-year triple-net lease with the YMCA; (2) Scattered Site Housing – the EHHA received a \$2M grant from the State of Connecticut to acquire distressed properties. \$1.8M in private financing will be used to renovate those properties. These homes are not subsidized under the Section 8 Program but the rents that are charged must meet Section 8 rent standards for the area. Currently the EHHA owns 6 multi-family homes or 14 rental units of which 11 units are occupied; (3) Veterans Terrace – a developer has been hired and a site development agreement is being negotiated with the developer and East Hartford Affordable Homes, which is a non-profit organization. The anticipated start date is late 2018; (4) HUD Safety & Security Grant – EHHA has applied for this annual grant and, if selected, would be eligible to receive \$250,000 to help defray the costs of installing exterior security cameras at Hockanum Park and Shea Gardens along with the software and hardware for monitoring the cameras; (5) Smoke-free Housing – HUD's new regulation – which became effective February 2017 – requires all Housing Authorities in the country to develop and implement a smoke-free housing policy banning the use of tobacco products inside the units and within 20' of the units by July 30, 2018; (6) Tenant Commissioner election – the term for the tenant commissioner expires July 2017. The EHHA must contact all residents within 60 days prior to the expiration to inform them that there is a vacancy on the Board of Commissioners and to see if they want to petition for an election; (7) Public Housing Program scores – the EHHA has been designated a "high performer" for 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2016. When EHHA is designated a High Performer, they receive 10% additional monies in their capital fund grant which helps support building improvements to their federal developments; (8) Section 8 scores – EHHA continues to be a high performer on Section 8 housing and has been since 2012.

Additionally it was noted that both the occupancy rate and the rent collection rate is in the 90th percentile.

2017-2018 School Readiness Grant

WHEREAS, the Town of East Hartford and East Hartford Public Schools desire to make and execute an application for funding in the amount of \$2,885,178 with the State of Connecticut to support School Readiness programs for East Hartford children.

Leclerc, Mayor of the Town of East Hartford, is hereby authorized to execute such application and, upon approval of said application, to enter into and execute a funding agreement and any amendments and other documents as may be required by the State of Connecticut for the School Readiness Program.

Community Development Block Grant 43rd Program Year Action Plan

WHEREAS, The Town of East Hartford is entitled to Forty-third Program Year funding under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, in the estimated amount of \$498,058; and

WHEREAS, upon notification of the Town's allocation for the 43rd Program Year (2017-2018), the amount of each proposed activity's budget will be proportionally increased or decreased from the estimated funding levels to match the allocation amounts; and

WHEREAS, receipt of this entitlement grant is contingent upon the submission of a Forty-third Program Year Action Plan, and Certifications of Compliance; and

WHEREAS, citizen input was obtained, in accordance with the Grants Administration Office's Citizen Participation Plan, at three Public Hearings held on November 7, 2016 and March 13, 2017.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town Council of the Town of East Hartford recognizes the need for funding the objectives contained in the Forty-third Program Year Action Plan and endorses this Plan as reflecting the Town's Community Development needs.

AND, FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town Council does support and authorize the submission of the Forty-third Program Year Action Plan, and Grantee Certifications to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and authorizes its Mayor, Marcia A. Leclerc, to act as representative of the Town and to enter into contract and any amendments thereof with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.



NEGLECTED CEMETERY ACCOUNT GRANT PROGRAM

BACKGROUND:

Section 19a-308 of the Connecticut General Statutes (C.G.S) defines a “neglected cemetery”, and subsection 19a-308(b) relieves municipalities, municipal employees, and agents and officers of municipalities from criminal or civil liability for undertaking the care and maintenance of a neglected cemetery.

Section 205 of Public Act 14-217 created the Neglected Cemetery Account and directed the Office of Policy and Management (OPM) to make grants to municipalities that wish provide upkeep to local, neglected cemeteries by: clearing them of weeds, briars and bushes; mowing the lawn areas; repairing walls and fences; straightening memorial stones and otherwise keeping these cemeteries in an orderly and decent condition.

GRANT PARAMETERS AND APPLICATION PROCESS:

Municipalities may apply for grants up to two thousand dollars (**\$ 2,000.00**) for the reclamation and maintenance of neglected cemeteries. Municipalities may **only submit one application each year** and awards will be made on a **first-come, first-served** basis until the Neglected Cemetery Account has been exhausted. It is anticipated that there will be another grant round during Fiscal Year 2017-2018.


Applications must be submitted no later than **September 20, 2016** and awards will be announced by **October 20, 2016**. Application forms may be found on the OPM website: <http://www.ct.gov/opm/cwp/view.asp?A=2985&Q=569274>.

Please note, due to the small cap on the maximum size of a grant award under this program, ***resolutions from the legislative body of the municipality are not required***. The municipality need only provide certified copies of the minutes of the meeting of its Board of Selectmen, Town or City Council (or equivalent body) and a certified copy of the minutes of its Board of Finance (or equivalent body) which authorizes the Chief Elected Official or Town Manager to apply for and administer this grant. The municipality will have up to thirty days after the date of preliminary approval of the application to provide these certified copies.

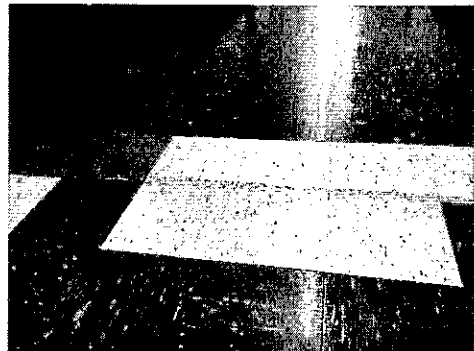

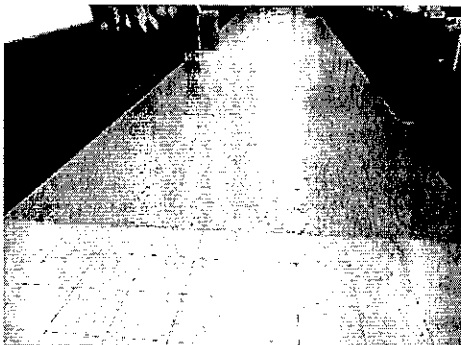
East Hartford Public Schools Department of Facilities is proposing a project to abate (remove) and replace all remaining asbestos containing tile flooring at the Hockanum Early Childhood Learning Center and replace with new Vinyl Composition Tile to match the new flooring design scheme.

Background / Existing Conditions

Hockanum School, home to the Early Childhood Learning Center (ECLC), was constructed in 1949, and much of the Vinyl Asbestos Tile (VAT) in the 51,800 square foot building is original. The building was converted to an ECLC 2016, and while the flooring in some classrooms and one hallway was abated and replaced at the time, funding and timing restraints prevented replacing the balance of the flooring.

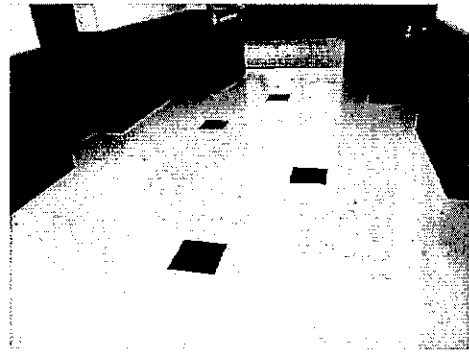


The North and West corridors contain well-worn VAT totaling approximately 6,500 square feet, and classrooms and support areas contain approximately 16,000 square feet of VAT. There are many unsightly patches throughout the building where flooring was damaged to the point of being a hazard, or where penetrations had to be dug under the floor and slab to access embedded domestic water lines to address leaks. The difference between the newly renovated areas and the original flooring is drastic, and creating uniformity in the facility will create a much better user

experience while eliminating potential health hazards and the risk of needing an emergency abatement when another leak under the slab occurs.

Project Overview

Project will properly abate all VAT and mastic and new Vinyl Composition Tile (VCT) will be installed in its place to match the new flooring design scheme adopted in 2016, which consists of a light gray tile with random dark blue tiles in the hallways, and a darker grey in the classrooms. The abatement process will require the school to be completely shut down during the Summer of 2018. Classroom furniture will be moved to the gym for the duration on the project. Once the abatement process is complete and air testing confirms the building is safe



to re-occupy, new VCT flooring will be installed and a protective finish applied prior to moving all furniture back. The building will be opened for the school year in late August of 2018

Project Budget

Design – Includes: Abatement Plans and specs, CT DPH application, pre-bid conference and contractor selection, abatement project management and required monitoring, air quality testing, and miscellaneous design drawings and professional services required for the State process.	\$35,000

Estimated State Reimbursement @ 76.43% = \$252,219

Funding Strategy

This project is eligible to be funded through the State of Connecticut Office of School Construction Grants program as a Code Correction project. Currently, East Hartford is eligible for reimbursement from the state at a rate of 76.43%, so East Hartford will only have to fund 23.57% of the project cost. The State

School Construction Grant Process requires that the Town of East Hartford authorizes 100% of the project cost, even though the Town will actually only fund its local share.

The East Hartford Board of Education will propose to the East Hartford Town Council that it authorizes the Board to submit the grant application (State OSCG Form ED-049).

Unless another funding strategy is suggested by the Town, the Board will be moving \$80,000 of FY 2018 Program 80 (Building Improvement) funds into an individual account for this project, representing proof of local share funding.

BACKGROUND: Capital Reserve Funds will be used to fund the local share of the ECLC Hockanum School flooring abatement project, replace a chiller at CIBA, remove (13) underground storage tanks district wide as required by CT. DEEP, and various other projects/equipment on the current capital projects priority list (see attached). Capital Reserve funds may also be used to as part of a settlement resulting from arbitration with the Rudolph Netsch Construction Company for the Goodwin School Roof Project.

Year end fund balances of up to one percent of the current operating budget or \$892,660, if available, will be transferred to the Town of East Hartford's Reserve Fund for these projects.

ACCOUNT AFFECTED BY TRANSACTION: There is no impact on the general budget. Funding will come from the accumulation of year end balances from all general budget accounts.



RE: PENSION ARBITRATION AWARD: Town of East Hartford and Local 1548 International Association of Fire Fighters Union, AFL-CIO

On January 28, 2016 the Town of East Hartford and Local 1548 International Association of Fire Fighters, AFL-CIO (hereinafter "the Firefighters Union") (collectively "the Parties") after reaching impasse entered into mandatory binding arbitration for a successor Pension Agreement, with a term of July 1, 2005 through June 30, 2015.

On May 25, 2017 the Town received a copy of the Interest Arbitration Award issued to the Parties by the State of Connecticut Board of Mediation and Arbitration. During the binding arbitration there were six issues presented to the arbitration panel by the Town and Firefighters Union. The following is a summary of each issue.

Issue 1 - Article II, Section 1 – Contributions of Employee

Issue one went to the Town and the pension contribution was raised from 8% to 9%. The Union offered to get to 9% but in two steps over a year.

Issue 2 - Article IV, Section 1 – Yearly Pension Amount

Issue two went to the Firefighters Union and for existing employees, their pension multiplier remains at 2.5% per year while new employees drop to 2.33%. The Town offered to maintain the multiplier for existing employees at 2.5%, but for new hires, we offered 2%, similar to the State MERS and other municipal plans.

Issue 3 – Article IV, Section 2 – COLA

Issue three went to the Firefighters Union and for existing employees, there was no change in their 1% COLA after their 5th year in retirement increasing to a 2% annual COLA in their 9th year of their retirement and new hires would receive a 1% annual COLA in their 7th year. The Town offered to reduce the annual 2% COLA to 1% for retirees retiring after July 1, 2025. New hires would not receive a COLA.

Issue 4 – Article IV, Section 4 – Maximum Pension

Issue four went to the Firefighters Union and it resulted in a maximum cap to annual pensions set at 100% of the employee base plus holiday pay and paramedic stipend for new hires. The Town offered to set the maximum cap to annual pensions at 100% of base pay for employees retiring after July 1, 2025 and 90% of base pay for new hires.

Issue 5 - Article XI, Section 6 – Maximum Retirement Benefit (language)

Item five went to the Firefighters Union resulting in no change to Article XI, Section 6 of the pension contract. The Town proposed that no such language should appear in the pension agreement and accordingly the language should be deleted.

Article XI , Section 6 reads as follows “In no event will any Employee receive at retirement anything less than what he would have received under the provisions of this Plan as constituted prior to July 1, 2005, as a result of this plan amendment.”

Issue 6 – Article XII – Duration (language)

Issue six went to the Town and resulted in the duration of the award being effective from July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2020. The Fire Fighter Union proposed the duration to take effect no sooner than January 1, 2022 unless an earlier date is mutually agreed upon.

Attached to this memorandum from Mike Walsh, the Finance Director is the financial analysis of the five- year Firefighters Union Pension Arbitration Award, and a copy of the State’s Interest Arbitration Award. Also, attached is an up to date pension contract between the Town of East Hartford and the Firefighters Union which incorporates and highlights all of the arbitration award language changes.

I request that this item be added to the Agenda of the June 06, 2017, Town Council meeting. The Town’s Finance and Human Resources Directors will be present at the meeting should there be any questions or concerns regarding the Arbitration Award or a need to go into executive session.

The Arbitration Award issued by the State Board of Mediation and Arbitration Panel was received by the Town on May 25, 2017. According to Section 7-473 c (10) and (12) of the General Statutes of the State of Connecticut, within twenty-five days of receipt of the arbitration award, the Town Council may reject the award by a two-thirds majority vote.

**ARBITRATION AWARD
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I. Proceedings

The Town of East Hartford (hereinafter Town) and the East Hartford Firefighters Association, Local 1548, IAFF, AFL-CIO (hereinafter Union) are parties to a Pension Agreement effective July 1, 2005 and expiring June 2015. Pursuant to applicable provisions of the Municipal Employees Relations Act, Section 7-460 et seq. of the Connecticut General Statutes, the parties commenced negotiations for a successor pension agreement. Thereafter, unable to reach agreement on all issues in dispute, the parties proceeded to binding arbitration.

This Arbitration Panel was designated in accordance with the Rules of Procedure of the State Board of Mediation and Arbitration and the provisions of Section 7-473c of the General Statutes. The parties executed a Joint Stipulation and Agreement waiving all timelines, including those for commencing the hearing and all procedural requirements, including the presentation of offering documents and cost data prior to the first hearing.

Pursuant to notice, the initial arbitration hearing commenced on January 28, 2016. This hearing was administrative in nature. Subsequent duly noticed evidentiary hearings were scheduled for and held on: May 10, 2016; May 19, 2016; May 26, 2016 and November 16, 2016¹. All hearings were conducted at the East Hartford Town Hall, East Hartford, Connecticut.

At the hearings, the parties were provided with a full opportunity to introduce evidence, examine and cross-examine witnesses and to make argument. A stenographic record of the proceeding was taken and transcribed. The hearing portion of the arbitration proceeding was declared closed effective November 16, 2016.

Pursuant to a schedule agreed to at the November 16, 2016 hearing and mutually extended subsequently, both parties timely submitted their last best offers and written post-hearing briefs and reply briefs. On April 3, 2017 and May 2, 2017, the Arbitration

Panel met in executive session. This Award follows the thoughtful deliberation of the Panel, after careful study of the record in its entirety, including all evidence and argument submitted by the parties in light of the statutory criteria enumerated in Section 4-473(c)(d)(9) of the Connecticut General Statutes. (See Section II)

Pursuant to the provisions of the above-cited Section, in addition to resolving each disputed issue, the Arbitration Panel is required to incorporate all items of agreement between the parties into its Award. These items are found in Section XI of the Award, titled Agreed Upon Language.

II. Statutory Factors

In assessing the evidence and arguments presented by the parties on each issue in dispute, the Panel must consider various statutory factors. These factors are contained in Section 4-473c(d)(9) of the Connecticut General Statutes, which reads:

In arriving at a decision, the arbitration panel shall give priority to the public interest and the financial capability of the municipal employer, including consideration of other demands on the financial capability of the municipal employer. The panel shall further consider the following factors in light of such financial capability: (A) The negotiations between the parties prior to arbitration; (B) the interests and welfare of the employee group; (C) changes in the cost of living; (D) the existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups; and (E) the wages, salaries, fringe benefits and other conditions of employment prevailing in the labor market, including developments in private sector wages and benefits.

IV. Facts Applicable to All Issues

(A) Introduction

In our analysis and evaluation of the evidence, the Panel must give priority to the “public interest and financial capability of the municipal employer, including consideration of other demands on the financial capability of the municipal employer.” (See: Section II) This arbitration concerns a successor agreement to the Pension Agreement between the Town and the Union, which expired on June 30, 2015. Thus, we are addressing a more limited range of issues, but no less significant, than typically found in an arbitration of a full collective bargaining agreement. Importantly, the impact of the issues before us have long term implications, not only for the Town but also for the employees.

The parties have introduced a voluminous amount of information. By the very nature of these proceedings some of the financial evidence we are using is data. Such is the nature of the evidence introduced in any arbitration proceeding.

(B) Public Interest

The East Hartford Fire Department is comprised of 126 firefighters. (Town 70) In 2013, they responded to 10,476 calls. (Union 2, Tab 2 at 2) As summarized in a Bond Statement for the same year,

Line operations are supported by eleven staff positions that contribute to maintaining a high degree of efficiency in the delivery of fire services.... the department continually updates its firefighters on fire suppression methods, apparatus and equipment utilization, hazardous materials response, rescue scenarios, arrangement of streets and hydrant locations and a variety of other subjects designed to reduce loss....

The Fire Department plays a major role in the delivery of Emergency Medical Services to the community. Firefighters are trained to provide medical care at the advanced life support level and to respond in a timely fashion from the five strategically located fire stations....

The Department’s resources include five fire stations, an apparatus repair facility and an office for the Fire Prevention Division. The five fire stations house five paramedic engines, one 95-foot Tower/Ladder truck, a 100-foot Ladder truck, one Heavy Rescue vehicle and a Command vehicle. In addition,

the department maintains one spare engine, one spare ladder truck, and one spare Heavy Rescue vehicle.... (Union 1, Tab 4 at 10-11)

Based on the delivery of fire suppression and medical services, it is in the public interest to have and maintain an efficient and effective Fire Department staffed by competent, well-trained and professional firefighters.

Concomitantly, it is in the public interest to ensure that the Town can recruit and retain a full cadre of firefighters. The compensation and benefits firefighters receive play an important role in achieving this goal. The pension plan is one component of this overall compensation and benefit plan. It is in the public interest for such a plan to be competitive in the marketplace; as evidenced by the statutory factors of the existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups and the benefits prevailing in the labor market, including developments in private sector benefits. This will assure the Town's continued ability to attract and retain well qualified employees to this critical service. It is also in the public interest for such a plan to be affordable and sustainable.

(B) Financial Capability

The Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2015, (Union 1, Tab 2) provides a starting point to review the Town's financial capability. The Report notes:

The Town of East Hartford is the home of over 75 diversified manufacturing plants and 1,800 businesses lending to the relative stability of the local economy. The Town continues to work to diversity its employment base by adding businesses and jobs, primarily in the service industry sector.²

The Town serves as the corporate and general headquarters for the Pratt & Whitney Division of United Technologies Corporation, which employees 30,000 people worldwide and 7,400 people in East Hartford. (Union 1, Tab 2 at iv)³

² Noteworthy, the 2014 unemployment rate of East Hartford was 8.5% compared to a County rate of 6.9% and a State rate of 6.6%. (Town 2, Tab 10)

³ According to the CERC Town Profile 2016, in 2014 United Technologies topped the Grand List at \$367,801,430. (Town 2, Tab 10)

The Report continues,

United Technologies, using stranded Research and Development tax credits earned from the State of Connecticut has committed to investing up to \$400 million within Connecticut including a substantial portion of that investment to build a new Corporate Headquarters and Engineering building in East Hartford. Construction is underway with an expected occupancy date of December, 2016. (Union 1, Tab 2 at iv)

Regarding its long-term financial planning, the Report notes,

The Town follows a prudent path when issuing debt by retiring debt over a ten-year life. When budgeting for pension purposes, the Town always contributes the ARC (Annual Required Contribution) in order to maintain a stable pension fund. (Union 1, Tab 2 at iv)

Additionally, the Report states:

The Town of East Hartford currently maintains an unassigned fund balance of \$15.7 million in its General Fund. As a percentage of the current adopted budget, East Hartford maintains 8.9% in reserve. The Town increased the reserve from the prior year by \$1.7 million.

The Town receives approximately one-third of budgeted revenues from the State of Connecticut. The vast majority of the State revenues that come to the Town are in the form of Educational Cost Sharing Grants (ECS) which provide a direct subsidy to the local education system. (Union 1, Tab 2 at iv)

Noteworthy, in 2017, after the Town adopted its budget, the State reduced the amount of monies flowing to the Town by approximately \$1.5 million. (Town 3, Tab 68) The serious financial consequences the state finds itself in will significantly impact revenue sharing beyond 2017. At this time, the extent of the impact is unknown. While some decry “runaway pension costs” (Town 3, Tab 66), the reality is that the failure to adequately fund the State pension fund over a lengthy period, higher life expectancies, as well as market fluctuations have all impacted the current economic environment.

Both the Town and the Union have introduced voluminous financial data. (See for example, Town 1, Tabs 1-6 and Union 1, Tabs 1-7) We considered all the data but, for purposes of an overview, only highlight some of it here. These highlights show a picture

of the Town's fiscal condition. We begin by noting that the Town is considered a "distressed municipality" under the provisions of state statute.

The Town has a bond rating of Aa2. (Town 1, Tab 1 at A-12) As for the pension, in FYE 2014 its Fiduciary Net Position as a percentage of TPL (total pension liability) was 62.8%. (Town 1, Tab 1 at A-22) Its median household income was \$50,355 or 72% of the state median household income; ranking it 158 out of 169. (Town 1, Tab 1 at B-5 and C-9) Its per capita income was \$25,509, ranking it 159 out of 169 cities and towns in Connecticut. (Town 1, Tab 1 at C-5) In per capita debt it fairs better at a ranking of 108, with an amount of \$1,299. (Town 1, Tab 1 C-6)

It had an unemployment rate of 8.5%, the 8th highest ranking in the state.⁴ Its TANF (Town aid to needy families) was 1.74% in 2014-15, down from 1.89% in 2013-14 but still ranking it 9th highest in the former year. (Town 1, Tab 1 at C-11) It net current expenditure per pupil was \$12,784 or 162nd in the state. (Town 1, Tab 1 at C1-4) Its equalized mill rate ranks it 6th (Town 1, Tab 1 at C-18) while its equalized net grand list per capita ranks it 155th with an amount of 477,144. (Town 1, Tab 1 at C-20)

All of the foregoing statistics, together with the documentary and testimonial evidence in the record lead the Panel to the conclusion that the Town's financial condition is relatively weaker than the vast majority of communities in the state. As we apply the statutory factors to the issues before us, we are mindful of this conclusion. Of the six issues before the Panel, four deal with direct economic issues. The resolution of these issues will provide some measure of financial relief to the Town's pension obligation regardless of which last best offer is selected.

We must decide each issue separately. However, in doing so, we must also be cognizant of the other provisions of the Pension Agreement. In their last best offers, the Union and the Town both recognize that economic realities will necessitate modifying the provisions

⁴ Sterling and Meriden also had an 8.5% unemployment rate. The rankings were in alphabetical order, which resulted in East Hartford ranked as 8th highest.

of the Pension Agreement for both current employees and new hires. Noteworthy, neither the Town nor the Union sought to establish a defined contribution plan to replace the defined benefit plan.

(C) Negotiations prior to arbitration

As applicable, the negotiations prior to arbitration will be discussed under specific issues in dispute.

(D) Interest and welfare of the employee group

As applicable, the interest and welfare of the employee group will be discussed under specific issues in dispute.

(E) Changes in the cost of living

As the Town notes, "The cost of living is low and stable." (Town Brief at 30) In a report dated December 2015, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported, "Over the last 12 months, the all items index increased 0.7 percent before seasonal adjustment." (Union 1, Tab 8) In a more recent report, the Bureau reported, "Over the last 12 months, the all items index rose 2.1 percent before seasonal adjustment." (Union 3, Tab 15)⁵ More detailed information was provided by both parties. (See generally: Union 1, Tab 8; Union 3, Tab 15; and, Town 3, Tab 54 and 62)

(F) The existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups

A comparison of the conditions of employment with similar groups will be made, as appropriate, under each issue in dispute.

(G) the wages, salaries, fringe benefits and other conditions of employment prevailing in the labor market, including developments in private sector wages and benefits

This factor will be discussed, as appropriate, under each item in dispute.

V. ISSUE #1 – Article II, Section 1—Contributions of Employees

1. Last Best Offers

Current Contract Language:

Section 1. Contributions of Employees – The rate of contribution to be made by each Employee shall equal eight percent (8%) of his Regular Compensation, beginning as soon as practicable after Town Council ratification of this agreement. Such employee contribution will cease to be contributed at the end of the Plan Year when the allowable maximum pension benefit amount is attained as defined in Article IV, Section 4 of the Retirement Plan.

Town's Last Best Offer:

Section 1. Contributions of Employees – Effective upon the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the rate of contribution to be made by each Employee shall equal nine percent (9%) of his Regular Compensation. Such employee contribution will cease to be contributed at the end of the Plan Year when the allowable maximum pension benefit amount is attained as defined in Article IV, Section 4 of the Retirement Plan.

Union's Last Best Offer:

Section 1. Contributions of Employees – The rate of contribution to be made by each Employee shall equal eight and one-half percent (8.5%) of his/her Regular Compensation on July 1, 2017. The rate of contribution to be made by each Employee shall equal nine percent (9%) of his/her Regular Compensation on July 1, 2019. Such employee contribution will cease to be contributed at the end of the Plan Year when the allowable maximum pension benefit amount is attained as defined in Article IV, Section 4 of the Retirement Plan.

2. Discussion

Since this arbitration is limited to pension issues, it is appropriate to review several general factors. First, the Agreement currently provides for a defined benefit plan. This type of retirement plan is one where employees are guaranteed a certain amount of retirement income. The determination of the pension amount is based on a formula; the parts of which are a percentage times the average salary, as defined by the Agreement, times number of years of employment. Neither last best offers seek to change the current type of plan.

The pension fund itself is funded by three sources: employee contributions, employer contributions and monies earned by the pension fund on investments. Issue 1 deals with the percentage of employee contributions, which, under the current pension Agreement, is 8%.

Both last best offers increase the contribution amount to 9%. The Union is proposing to reach this amount in stages while the Town is proposing to implement the 9% effective the date of this award, but not retroactively to July 1, 2015. Thus, for the first two years of this Agreement, the employees' contribution rate will have remained unchanged.

The Town summarizes the economic impact of the two proposals:

...the financial impact of the proposed contribution increase to 9% would immediately decrease the Town's net normal cost for the retirement plan by about \$123,000, or 1% of the present \$12.3 million payroll. This change has no effect on the plan's accrued liability. The Union's proposal on the other hand would delay any cost reduction for the Town until July 1, 2017, and the amount would be only \$61,500. A further savings of .5% of payroll or and an additional \$61,500 would not take place until July 1, 2019. (Town Brief at 5, citations omitted)

The Town argues, "Runaway pension costs are not just a problem that the Town is experiencing. It is a national, statewide and local issue." (Town Brief at 7) To support its contention, the Town cites to a May 29, 2016 *Wall Street Journal* article titled, "Connecticut, America's Richest State, Has a Huge Pension Problem." (Town 3, Tab 58) The article is telling. It states,

Connecticut's surprising pension predicament shows how even the wealthiest parts of the U.S. are struggling to keep pace with ballooning retirement obligations that now amount to \$1 trillion nationally. (Town 3, Tab 58 at 2)

The article continues,

Connecticut's unfunded pension liabilities more than doubled over the past decade to \$26 billion as the state's retirement system reeled from inadequate state contributions, a subpar investment record and longer lifespans for its retirees. (Town 3, Tab 58 at 2)

Additionally, it observes,

Connecticut's pension gap developed as a result of decisions made over decades to scrimp on payments.... Connecticut officials contributed almost no money to the state's various public pensions from the late 1930's until the early 1980's, meaning little had been saved up because the state had chosen not to prefund the retirement system for future payouts. (Town 3, Tab 58 at 3)

With regard to how the state will address the issue, "Their strategy hinges partly on predictions the various state retirement systems will be able to earn 8% or more annually, a goal that is more optimistic than most public pensions across the U.S. The average target for all state plans is 7.68%...." (Town 3, Tab 58 at 2)

Recognizing the fiscal impact the state's finances have on the Town, a closer look at its pension plan is warranted. The Town administers "a single –employer, contributory, defined benefit pension plan...." (Town 3, Tab 75 at 1) It has varying degrees of benefits and contributions depending on the provisions of several collective bargaining agreements. As of June 2016, it has a net pension liability of \$180,879,350, with an actuarial assumption discount rate, i.e., investment rate of return, of 8%. (Town 3, Tab 75 at 14 and 16) In other words, when making its ARC or annual required contribution, the Town assumes an investment rate of return of 8%.

The Town's actuary notes, "The report uses a discount rate of 8.00%. This rate was selected by the Town. We suggest using a rate in the 7.00 – 7.50% range." (Town 3, Tab

75)⁶ The consequence of a lower discount rate would mean an increased contribution by the Town since the employees' contribution rate is a fixed 8% of their compensation. Decreasing the discount rate to the lower 7% recommendation would increase the net liability of the plan from \$180,879,350 to \$224,901,951. (Town 3, Tab 75 at 15)

We note that using the 8% discount rate, the Town's pension plan is funded at 53.52%. (Town 3, Tab 57 at 16) Were the discount rate to be reduced, a reduction in the percentage of funding would also occur. This projection of 8% may serve to reduce the ARC contribution but does not necessarily address the long-term viability of the plan.⁷ Such a determination will depend, in part, on actual investment performance over the long term. The history of the stock and bond market are varied, with some years of double digit gains and some with double digit losses and everything in between. Nowhere is this more evident than in the testimony of the Town's actuary.

He stated, "...the Town has essentially contributed what has been recommended over the past ten years." (May 26, 2016 Tr. at 23) However, he observed that "the most significant" item in the evaluation of the Pension Plan analysis (Town 3, Tab 75) is "the value of assets returning zero instead of the expected 8[%]" in 2016. (May 26, 2016 Tr. at 17) This is a variable over which neither the Town nor the employees have control.

Both parties agree that an increase in employee contributions will be a positive factor for the plan's viability. And, it is clearly in the interest of both the Town and the Union to have a viable plan that is both affordable and sustainable.

As for the employer's contribution, "The present cost of the fire fighters pension in terms of the Town's required contribution as of July 1, 2016 is \$4,322,835 or 33.91% of the total contribution the Town makes for all of its plans." (Town Brief at 6)

⁶ Note: In its Pension Plan Actuarial Valuation and Review, dated July 1, 2015, the Town's actuary recommended a discount rate of between 6.75% to 7.25%. (Town 30 at ii; see also May 26, 2016 Tr., Vol 3 at 18)

⁷ Interestingly, nine towns with discount rates between 6.25% and 7.50% have a higher funded percentage than East Hartford. (Town 71)

Noteworthy, the Town asserts,

...the financial impact of the proposed contribution increase to 9% would immediately decrease the Town's net normal cost for the retirement plan by about \$123,000, or 1% of the present \$12.3 million payroll. This change has no effect on the plan's accrued liability.... The Union's proposal on the other hand would delay any cost reduction for the Town until July 1, 2017, and the amount would be only \$61,500. A further savings of .5% of payroll, or an additional \$61,500 would not take place until July 1, 2019. (Town Brief at 5, citations omitted)

The Town characterizes the above thusly,

Another way of analyzing the Union's proposal is that if the Union's last best offer on this issue is granted, the Town will lose approximately \$184,500 [using a January 1, 2017 to June 30, 2019 calculation period] in pension cost savings using the present \$12.3 million payroll figure from the time of the award until July 1, 2019. (Town Brief at 5, footnote omitted)

This is the only issue before the Panel that has an immediate impact on the current pension obligations of the Town. The financial capability of the Town supports its last best offer. The immediacy of the increase when juxtaposed to the current financial health of the Town, especially with the mid-term reduction in state revenue, weigh heavily on the decision of the Panel Majority. Thus, the two priority statutory factors support the Town's last best offer.

As to the subordinate factors, the interests and welfare of the employee group supports both the Union's last best offer and the Town's last best offer. The Union acknowledges, "The economic realities...necessitate changes going forward and the Union is ready, willing and has proposed changes which will, over time, decrease the pension liability for the Town...." (Union Brief at 7) As such, it is in the employees' interest to insure the long-term viability of a plan that will fund their retirement benefits.

The immediate increase of the pension contribution will begin a process of change. However, the implementation date contained in the Town's last best offer will also impact immediately the take home pay of firefighters. There are no issues before the Panel that will offset this reduction. This fact is considered by the Panel on the other economic issues before us.

As to the existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups, there is support for the last best offer of the Union. Throughout its brief the Union asserts that it just wants to be treated as other unions. The Union notes, “The Union’s last best offer...is consistent with the agreement made between the Town and Town Employee Pension Coalition.” (Union Brief at 19) The Union’s argument is well taken.

Additionally, a review of the contribution percentages of comparative towns and cities further supports the Union’s position. As the Union notes, “Bristol Firefighters pay 6%, CMERS⁸ pays 5%, City of Hartford pays 8% [see update following quote], Naugatuck pays 6%, City of New Britain Fire pays 5½% employee contributions, City of New London pays 6% employee contribution, City of Norwich Fire pays 8% and City of Torrington Fire pays 8%.” (Union Brief at 20-21, see also: Union 2, Tab 5) Additional comparatives also support the Union’s last best offer—Hamden, 8.50% [plan closed to new hires in 2006]; Meriden, 6.00%; Stamford, 6.25%; and, West Haven, 8.5% [post 1985 hires, closed to new hires 2013]. (Town 3, Tab 47) There is one update. In a newly negotiated collective bargaining agreement, Hartford Firefighters now contribute 11% of total pay. (Town 4, Tab 4)

It must be noted that many factors are included when determining the actual pension benefit, including whether overtime is included. The last best offer of both the Town and the Union base the contribution percentage on “Regular Compensation.” In the Pension Agreement (see Agreed Upon Language), “Regular Compensation” is defined as: “annual salary or wages of an Employee...including overtime, holiday, longevity payments and vacation pay....” (See: Agreed Upon Language, Retirement Plan for Full-Time Employees of the Fire Department of the Town of East Hartford, Article 1, Section 15 at 6)

In summary, the Panel Majority finds the priority factors of public interest and the financial capability of the Town support the Town’s last best offer. The subordinate

⁸ “CMERS” is an acronym for Connecticut Municipal Employee Retirement System.

factor of the interests and welfare of the employee group supports both last best offers while the existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups supports the last best offer of the Union.

3. Award:

Based on a review of all the evidence and argument, in light of the statutory criteria, the Panel Majority awards the **Last Best Offer of the Town on Issue 1**. Based on the same statutory criteria, Mr. DiScipio dissents.

VI. ISSUE #2 – Article IV, Section 1—Yearly Pension Amount

1. Last Best Offers

Current Contract Language:

Section 1. Subject to the maximum and minimum limitations herein set forth, the Retirement Board shall pay to each Employee who has retired in accordance with Article VI, a Normal Retirement Pension for life. The yearly amount of such Pension will equal two and one-half percent (2.5%) of his Final Average Salary multiplied by the number of years of his Credited Service with the Employer as a Firefighter. One-twelfth (1/12) of this amount will be paid monthly.

Town's Last Best Offer:

Section 1. Subject to the maximum and minimum limitations herein set forth, the Retirement Board shall pay to each Employee who has retired in accordance with Article VI, a Normal Retirement Pension for life. The yearly amount of such Pension will equal two and one-half percent (2.5%) of his Final Average Salary multiplied by the number of years of his Credited Service with the Employer as a Firefighter. For all employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the yearly amount of such Pension will equal two percent (2.0%) of his Final Average Salary multiplied by the number of years of his Credited Service with the Employer as a Firefighter. One-twelfth (1/12) of this amount will be paid monthly.

Union's Last Best Offer:

Section 1. Subject to the maximum and minimum limitations herein set forth, the Retirement Board shall pay to each Employee who has retired in accordance with Article VI, a Normal Retirement Pension for life. The yearly amount of such Pension will equal two and one-half percent (2.5%) of his Final Average Salary multiplied by the number of years of his Credited Service with the Employer as a Firefighter. an employee of the fire department. For all employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the yearly amount of such Pension will equal two and thirty-three one hundredths percent (2.33%) of his/her Final Average Salary multiplied by the number of

years of his Credited Service with the Employer as a ~~Firefighter~~ an employee of the fire department. One-twelfth (1/12) of this amount will be paid monthly.

2. Discussion:

Neither the Town's nor the Union's last best offer amend the 2.5% multiplier for current employees. Both agree that the multiplier for new hires should be modified, commencing on or after the issuance of this Award. The Union's proposal would reduce the multiplier to 2.33% for new hires. The Town's proposal would reduce the multiplier for new hires to 2.0%. Thus, both offers recognize the necessity to reduce the multiplier. The difference between the two is 0.33%.

On a practical basis, the difference is significant. If, for example, a new hire was to be employed for 30 years, his or her pension, based on the Union's last best offer would be 69.9% of the final average salary. The same employee would have a pension of 60% of the final average salary if the Town's last best offer was awarded.⁹ Importantly, the "Final Average Salary" is defined as an "Employees' average annual pay, including overtime, holiday, longevity payments, and vacation pay.... Any deferred salary or deferred wages that are considered annual salary or pay/wages...." (See: Agreed Upon Language, Retirement Plan for Full-Time Employees of the Fire Department of the Town of East Hartford, Article 1, Section 6 at 5)

Using a hypothetical \$80,000 final average salary, the Union's proposal would mean a yearly pension of \$55,920, while the Town's proposal would mean a yearly pension of \$48,000; a difference of \$7,920 a year. As a comparison, if the 2.5% multiplier was not modified, a thirty-year employee with the same final average salary would have a pension based on 75% or \$60,000. Thus, under both offers, the pension liability of the fund is reduced.

⁹ See Issue 4 where both parties submitted last best offers that would change the maximum pension amount that could be received.

There is “no immediate cost savings to the Town’s last best offer since current employees are unaffected.” (Town Brief at 10) Likewise, there is no immediate cost savings to the Union’s last best offer for the same reason.

The evidence does provide us with a suggestion as to the number of potential new hires. The Union noted that “approximately 49 current members of the Union, a little less than half, will be eligible to retire within the next 24 months.” (Union Brief at 23) The Town observed, “There are 127 members of the bargaining unit, and 83, or 65.3% of them...are eligible to retire before July 1, 2025....” (Town Brief at 14)

A closer look at the potential retirements is in order. Currently, there are 10 firefighters eligible to retire. Thus, approximately 8% of the current cadre of fire fighters have continued with their employment past their eligibility date. Clearly, while this number is small, it indicates that not all fire fighters who are eligible choose to retire on their eligibility date. (Town 3, Tab 70) What is not in evidence is how many of these individuals are in the DROP program.

There are another 10 fire fighters who are eligible to retire in 2018, 21 in 2019 and 9 in 2020. (Town 3, Tab 70) Thus, over the length of this pension agreement (See Issue 6) there will be 40 firefighters eligible to retire. What is not known is when any of the above members will retire or, for analytical projections, what percentage of members in past yearly cohorts did retire. Nonetheless, it is reasonable to anticipate retirements are on the horizon; especially since there is a mandatory retirement age of sixty-five. (May 19, 2016 Tr. at 86)

When considering a job, perspective employees are not only considering salary but also retirement benefits, as well as other benefits and working conditions. The fact that the firefighters have a defined benefit plan will undoubtedly assist the Town in recruiting and retaining well qualified firefighters, which is clearly in the public interest. Further, “firefighting is a young man’s game.” (May 19, 2016 Tr. at 84) The potential consequences of a fire fighter working into their “late fifties, early sixties or to the sixty-five max” might be an increase in either workers’ compensation and other disabilities, a detrimental effect

on the Town. (May 19, 2016 Tr. at 87) As we have said from the outset, the retirement plan must be sustainable, competitive and fair. Long-term viability of the plan is imperative.

The Town supports its last best offer with three primary arguments. First, the Town describes the economic impact of both offers as follows:

The 2.5% multiplier [for current employees] has a long-term expressed normal cost of 16.6% of payroll. 'Switching to the 2.0% formula and barring any future changes, the normal cost will gradually decline to 13.3% of payroll.' The cost estimate for the Union's last best offer is that with the 2.33% multiplier the normal cost will eventually decline to only 15.5% of payroll. The difference between the two proposals is 2.2% of payroll. This is not an insignificant difference. For example, in present dollars that percentage calculated against the current payroll of \$12.3 million amounts to \$270,000. (Town Brief at 10, citations omitted)¹⁰

For both last best offers the Town's Actuary did note "that long-term normal costs are actually expected to be slightly less than those stated above, since over time the pre-1995 hires will retire and be replaced by post-1994 hires, who have a different definition of Final Average Salary." (Town 3, Tabs 72 and 76)

Second, the Town notes that it "substantially modified its position on this issue during the course of negotiations and this binding arbitration case." (Town Brief at 9) It continues, "At the outset of the fire fighters pension negotiations the Town's proposal was to reduce this ... multiplier from 2.5% to 1.5% effective July 1, 2015 for current employees as well as future hires." (Town Brief at 9) Indeed, the Town has moved from its initial position to one where new hires would have the 2.0% multiplier, with current employees maintaining the 2.5% multiplier.

Third, it observes, the "retirement plan for the Teamsters police dispatchers has a multiplier of only 2.2% for all employees.... The multiplier in the Full-Time General Employees' pension plan is 2.333% applicable to all employees.... All paraprofessionals covered under East Hartford of Para-educators Local #4257 have a 2.2% multiplier.... the

¹⁰ Referring to the Town's last best offer, but applicable to the Union's as well, the Town's actuary indicated that the change in the multiplier would impact the pension plan "eventually, very-long term." (Tr. Vol 3 at 25)

Town's approximately 60 non-union employees follow the same terms as in the General Employees' pension plan. The 2.5% pension multiplier for the fire fighters is on the high side when compared to similar benchmark towns: Meriden, New Britain, and West Haven.... See also, the comparison to Bridgeport – Plan B, Ledyard, and the MERS plans.” (Town Brief at 10-11)

The Union advances its argument by observing, “...the Town voluntarily agreed for other employees to reduce the multiplier to 2.33% and the Union believes that it should not be treated disparately or have a lower multiplier.” (Union Reply Brief at 3) It further references the Dispatchers at 2.2% and the Police agreement, which goes to December 31, 2021, at 2.5%. (Union Brief at 21)

A further review is necessary. The Dispatchers have a multiplier of 2.2%. (Town, Tab 43 at 2) However, the General Employees and by arrangement the non-union employees, who receive the same benefits, have a multiplier of 2.333%¹¹. (Town 3, Tab 38) This percentage was continued in the pension agreement ending June 30, 2022. Interestingly, prior to 2005, the multiplier was 2.2%. (Town 3, Tab 46) However, there is an important fact to consider. “Post-2006 employees are entered into the defined contribution plan.” (May 19, 2016 Tr. at 32; see also Town 3, Tab 75 at 4)

The police pension agreement expires December 2021. It has a multiplier of 2.5%; with contributions remaining at 8%. (Town 3, Tab 45) Thus, for approximately the next four years, pensions for new hires in the police department would continue to have a 2.5% multiplier. There was no evidence as to the anticipated number of new hires for the police department.

Citing to testimony, the Town argues, “The 2.5% pension multiplier for the fire fighters is on the high side when compared to similar benchmark towns: Meriden, New Britain, and West Haven... See also, the comparison to Bridgeport – Plan B, Ledyard, and the MERS plans.” (Town Brief at 11) The Town expands the list in an exhibit. (Town 3, Tab 47) But,

¹¹ There is an extremely slight difference when calculating a pension based on a multiplier of 2.33% compared to 2.333%. The difference is so insignificant that it plays no role in our determination.

the Town is not seeking to reduce the 2.5% for current employees. And, both parties are reducing the multiplier for new hires.

In comparative Towns, how does East Hartford fare? In our analysis of the comparison towns we must look not only as the multiplier but other, interrelated, components of the plan, to the extent we can. We start with CMERS, whose participants include Bridgeport and New London. Focusing only on the multiplier, the Town has a point since the CMERS multiplier is 2%. But, the employees on contribute 5% or 2.25% if they will receive social security. If it is the latter then the 2.25% of compensation is up to the social security taxable wage base then, beyond that, 5% on the excess. (Town 3, Tab 47) The employee contribution of 5% is significantly lower than the 9% contribution of all East Hartford firefighters, commencing with this award or even the 8% current employee contribution.

CMERS also has a minimum annual COLA of 2.5%, with a maximum of 6%. This is in comparison to the fixed 1% per annum COLA commencing in the 7th year of retirement for new hires in East Hartford. (See Issue 3)

In Meriden, the multiplier is 2.0% for the first 20 years and 2.5% thereafter. Thus, if an employee worked for 25 years the average multiplier would be 2.1%. But, firefighters in Meriden only contribute 6% of base salary. This is less than the 9% of regular compensation, which all East Hartford fire fighters will be contributing. Plus, there is a 2% COLA, with apparently no waiting period. (Town 3, Tab 47)

West Haven's defined benefit plan was closed to new hires as of July 1, 2013. (Town 3, Tab 47) Thus, it appears that hires after the July 1 date are in a defined contribution plan. Ledyard appears to have closed its defined benefit plan to hires after January 1, 2013. (Town 3, Tab 47)

Since a defined contribution plan was never on the table here, the comparison to West Haven and Ledyard lacks relevance. Although, when view together with the fact that the General Employees and Paraprofessional Employees in East Hartford now have a defined contribution plan (Town 3, Tab 75), it may be a predictive trend.

However, even in Hartford, where the economic situation is considerably worse than East Hartford, the most recent negotiated settlement between the City and the fire fighters provides for a multiplier of 2% for new hires. % (Town Reply Brief, Appendix, “Tentative Agreement between the City of Hartford and Hartford Fire Fighters Association, Local 760”)¹² There is also an 11% contribution of total wages for all employees; a 2% higher contribution rate than East Hartford after this award. The Union does point out that for current fire fighters in Hartford, the multiplier is “2.8% pension amount for the first 25 years of service and 2% for each year thereafter.” (Union Brief at 21)

Nonetheless, on the record before us and based on an overall assessment of internal and external comparisons of existing defined benefit plans, the evidence supports the Union’s last best offer.

Finance Director Walsh testified that the plan was 116% funded in approximately 1998 but is currently funded at 60%. (May 19, 2016 Tr. at 87) The reason for the precipitous decline—the stock market drop of 2001 (after 9/11) and in 2008. (May 19, 2016 Tr. at 89) Recovery has been, to say the least, slow but there have been market improvements since 2014. However, as noted in the introductory facts, the state economy is not faring well.

Balancing the immediate need for potential hiring with the current economic conditions, the public interest supports the last best offer of the Union.

Equally, the financial capability of East Hartford is such that it can plan for the eventuality that new employees will have a multiplier of 2.33%, which as the Town notes will eventually reduce the long term normal cost. (Town Brief at 14) In this regard, the Union’s last best offer reduces the Town’s pension obligation by 1.1% actuarially, without any offset.

Finance Director Walsh testified that the Town sought an increased contribution to the pension costs; which will happen. In addition, the Town was seeking “... a reduction in

¹² The Panel takes arbitral notice that the tentative agreement was ratified by the Union and approved by the Hartford City Council.

COLA, a reduction in the multiplier, and then a cap so that we can get, again, a sustainable pension moving forward for both the employees who enjoy it and residents who pay for it.” (May 19, 2016 Tr. at 49) These will also happen to the extent provided in each issue being awarded by the Panel.

The statute requires the Arbitration Panel to make awards on each last best offer. In doing so, we cannot summarily ignore the interrelated provisions of the Pension Agreement. Therefore, the Panel Majority notes that the Town’s pension costs will be reduced with: the immediate increase in the pension contribution to 9% (Issue 1); the reduction of the multiplier for new employees (Issue 2); the reduction in future COLA payments (Issue 3); and, the redefinition of final average salary for maximum pension amount (Issue 4). (See: Town 72 and Town 76) If economic conditions do not improve it takes no crystal ball to predict that further modifications to the pension plan may be necessary, including a review of the multiplier. In this regard, it should be noted that the Panel is awarding the shorter duration as offered by the Town on Issue 6. But, at this juncture, the Panel Majority find the evidence supports the last best offer of the Union.

3. Award:

Based on a review of all the evidence and argument, in light of the statutory criteria, the Panel Majority awards the **Last Best Offer of the Union Issue #2**. Based on the same statutory criteria, Mr. Romanow dissents.

VII. ISSUE #3 – Article IV, Section 2 – COLA

1. Last Best Offers

Current Contract Language:

Section 2. Employees who physically retire after the effective date of this Agreement shall receive a cost-of-living adjustment of one percent (1%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the fifth (5th) calendar year after the calendar year in which a participant retires. The cost-of-living adjustment will be increased to two percent (2%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the ninth (9th) year of actual retirement.

Town's Last Best Offer:

Section 2. Current employees as of the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, who physically retire after July 1, 2025, shall receive a cost-of-living adjustment of one percent (1%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the fifth (5th) calendar year after the calendar year in which a participant retires. All employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1 shall not receive any cost-of-living adjustments following their retirement.

Union's Last Best Offer:

Section 2. Current employees as of the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, shall receive a cost-of-living adjustment of one percent (1%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the fifth (5th) calendar year after the calendar year in which a participant retires. The cost-of-living adjustment will be increased to two percent (2%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the ninth (9th) year of actual retirement. All employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1 shall receive a cost-of-living adjustment of one percent (1%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the seventh (7th) calendar year after the calendar year in which a participant retires.

2. Discussion:

The Union is proposing to retain the current COLA benefits for employees on the payroll as of the effective date of the arbitration award, i.e., a 1% cost of living increase for retirees beginning in the fifth calendar year after the calendar year when a participant retires, increasing to 2% beginning in the 9th year of retirement. For new employees hired after the date of this award, the Union's last best offer is a COLA of 1%, which would begin in the 7th calendar year after the calendar year in which the employee retired. There would be no increase in the COLA subsequently for those employees.

The Town's last best offer provides for those who physically retire after July 1, 2025 to receive a 1% COLA beginning in the 5th year after the calendar year in which the participant retires. Employees hired on or after the date of this award would receive no COLA upon retirement. "...the existing COLA is maintained for any bargaining unit member retiring on or before July 1, 2025." (Town Reply Brief at 7)

The Town notes, "There are 127 members of the bargaining unit, and 83, or 65.3% of them who are eligible to retire before July 1, 2025 would not face any reduction in cost of living adjustments following their retirement." (Town Brief at 14, emphasis added) The Town reasoning for its proposal is admirable. As explained:

The Town needed to reduce its pension cost because of the significant increase in unfunded pension liability and required pension contributions. At the same time the Town wanted to protect those current employees close to retirement by maintaining their benefits. The newer employees much farther away from retirement would have to face a reduction of some benefits. Future hires would experience the greatest degree of benefits reduction. (Town Brief at 15-16)

The Union opines, "Under the Town's last best offer, Section 2 does not contain the current benefit, but rather only addresses what transpires to employees who physically retire after July 1, 2025, which provides a reduced 1% per annum cost of living for those employees and eliminates the COLA for all employees going forward." (Union Brief at 23) It reiterates its position when it asserts, "If awarded it [Town's last best offer] would

require all current employees to remain employed until 2025 to receive a COLA adjustment at all.” (Union Reply Brief at 5).

Of course, all current employees could not remain employed until 2025 since there is a mandatory retirement age of 65. (May 19, 2016 Tr. at 86) No information was provided as to the number of employees who would be required to retire prior to July 1, 2025, i.e., those who would reach the mandatory retirement age.

The last best offer of the Town seemingly contains a COLA provision void for those employees retiring between the date of the award and 2025. The Town asserts, “the existing COLA is maintained for any bargaining unit member retiring on or before July 1, 2025. (Town Reply Brief at 7) Even if this is the case, the Panel Majority finds the evidence supports the last best offer of the Union. We reach this conclusion for several reasons.

Long-term employees who have remained in the employ of the Town in anticipation of receiving, among other items, their pensions should not have conditions change absent agreement to do so. Indeed, they have been working for their retirement benefit their entire career with the Town.

Specifically, in this regard, there are nine employees who would not be eligible to retire, if they were so inclined to do so, until July 14, 2025. (Town 3, Tab 70) They would be just shy of two weeks from being able to obtain the current COLA notwithstanding the fact that they would have been employed by the Town for twenty-five years.

Additionally, the Union’s last best offer “would have no effect on the current cost of the plan and would ... result in a gradual reduction of the long term normal cost from 16.6% to approximately 15.2 – 15.3% of payroll.” (Town Brief at 14)

As mentioned previously, it is in the public interest for the Town to have a sustainable, competitive and fair pension plan for its firefighters. The Union's last best offer recognizes this principle.

Noteworthy, the Union points out that the increase in contribution payments from 6% to its current 8% was in a large measure due to securing a COLA. (Union Brief at 24) Thus, the history of past negotiations supports the Union's last best offer, especially when the award on Issue 1 is considered. Further supporting the Union's last best offer is the interest and welfare of the employee group. While we cannot predict the cost of living 25 years from now, the modest 1% COLA for new hires after the seventh year of retirement supports the Union's last best offer.

Both the Town and the Union use other town units as comparable employee groups. To this end, the Town notes,

The police dispatchers...do not have a cost of living benefit in their pension plan. Similarly the paraprofessionals bargaining unit does not have a COLA provision in its retirement plan. (Town Brief at 15, citations omitted)

The Town also observes, "In its 2015 negotiations for the Full Time General Employees Retirement Plan the Town was able to reduce the current 2% COLA for those employees retiring after July 1, 2025." (Town Brief at 15, citation omitted) However, a closer review of this plan reveals that employees retiring between July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2025 receive a 2% cost of living adjustment after 5 years and those retiring after July 1, 2025 receive a 1.5% cost of living adjustment. These provisions, when compared to the last best offer of the Town, are more generous. And, as the Union points out, "... the Police continue to receive a COLA of 2% after 5 years and a 1% increase after 9 years...." (Union Brief at 25)

Thus, when viewed in their entirety, the “existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups” supports the last best offer of the Union.

Therefore, the Panel Majority finds the Union’s last best offer is supported by the priority factors of the public interest and the financial capability of the Town, in addition to the subordinate factors of the interest and welfare of the employee group and the existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups.

3. Award:

Based on a review of all the evidence and argument, in light of the statutory criteria, the Panel Majority awards the **Last Best Offer of the Union on Issue 3**. Based on the same statutory criteria, Mr. Romanow dissents.

VIII. ISSUE #4 – Article IV, Section 4 – Maximum Pension

1. Last best Offers

Current Contract Language:

The maximum yearly Pension for an Employee who retires under this Retirement System will equal seventy-five percent (75%) of his Final Average Salary.

Town's Last Best Offer:

Section 4. Effective July 1, 2025 for all current employees as of the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the maximum yearly Pension for an Employee who retires under this Retirement System will not exceed one-hundred percent (100%) of the Final Average Salary at retirement. For all employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the maximum yearly Pension for an Employee who retires under this Retirement System will not exceed ninety percent (90%) of the Final Average Salary at retirement. For purposes of this Section only, Final Average Salary shall mean the salary applicable to the employee's permanent classification at the time of retirement as specified in the Contract between the Town and the Union, and it shall not include overtime, annual holiday pay, paramedic stipend, lump sum sick or vacation time paid, or any other earned compensation.

Union's Last Best Offer:

Section 4. For current employees as of the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the maximum yearly Pension for an Employee who retires under this Retirement System will equal seventy-five percent (75%) of his Final Average Salary as defined in Article 1, Sections 6a and 6b.

For all employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the maximum yearly Pension for an Employee who retires under this Retirement System will not exceed one-hundred percent (100%) of the employee's base salary at time of retirement. For purposes of this Section only - for all employees

hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1 - base pay shall mean the salary applicable to the employee's classification and labor grade step at the time of retirement plus any annual stipends or payments including, but not limited to annual holiday pay and paramedic stipend as specified in the Contract between the Town and the Union.

Discussion:

We begin the discussion by noting that both the last best offers will save the Town future pension monies. As the Town states,

The future part of the Town's last best offer dealing with new hires (90% cap on benefits) would gradually reduce the expected long term normal cost from 16.6% to 15.2% of payroll. There would be no effect on the current cost of the pension plan. The Town's actuary calculated that the Union's last best offer would result in only a gradual decline in the long-term normal cost from 16.6% to 15.9% of payroll as the current population retires and is replaced by new hires. There would be no impact on the current cost of the plan." (Town Brief at 18, citations omitted)

With regard to the Town's last best offer, the Union asserts the it does not address what happens to "current employees who retire prior to July 1, 2025." (Union's Brief at 26) The Town has explained, as it did in Issue 3, that its last best offer "would maintain in effect the existing cap on pension benefits for current employees retiring before July 1, 2025." (Town Brief at 17) Even if this is the case, the Panel Majority finds the evidence supports the last best offer of the Union.

Incorporating the testimony of the Town Fiscal Director, the Union asserted:

...Mr. Walsh presented 2 cost sheets for employees who had recently retired who received significantly above the 100% of their base salary at time of retirement because of the definition of final average salary which includes overtime, annual holiday pay, Paramedic stipend, lump sum sick or vacation and other earned compensation. The Union going forward is eliminating these emoluments [for new hires] except for annual holiday pay and Paramedic stipend and also putting an absolute cap of 100% on the employee's pension amount going forward. (Union Brief at 27)

The Union's offer that places a cap on the amount of retirement pension new employees will earn, and which excludes overtime from the calculation, is in the public interest. This contributes to making the plan affordable and sustainable. As with Issue 3, using the July 1, 2025 date proffered by the Town would negatively impact nine current employees who would be eligible to retire on July 14, 2025. Thus, they would have worked their entire career in East Hartford only to see their retirement benefits potentially decrease at the very end of their careers. This neither serves the public interest nor is it justified by application of any of the statutory standards.

When the two last best offers are compared, the financial impact for the Town is minimal. Any retirement benefits in excess of the final average salary would be eliminated by both last best offers, a positive financial aspect for the Town. Thus, the Town will not find itself in the position where initial annual pensions will exceed the base salary at the date of retirement; an occurrence that has happened in the past. (Town 3, Tab 65)

3. Award:

Based on a review of all the evidence and argument, in light of the statutory criteria, the Panel Majority awards the **Last Best Offer of the Union on Issue 4**. Based on the same statutory criteria, Mr. Romanow dissents.

IX. ISSUE #5 – Article XI, Section 6 – Maximum Retirement Benefit

1. Last Best Offers

Current Contract Language:

In no event will any Employee receive at retirement anything less than what he would have received under the provisions of this Plan as constituted prior to July 1, 2005, as a result of this plan amendment.

Town's Last Best Offer:

~~Section 6. In no event will any Employee receive at retirement anything less than what he would have received under the provisions of this Plan as constituted prior to July 1, 2005, as a result of this plan amendment.~~

(The Town proposes that no such language should appear in the pension agreement and accordingly the above language should be deleted in its entirety)

Union's Last Best Offer:

In no event will any Employee hired prior to the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1 receive at retirement anything less than what he/she would have received under the provisions of this Plan as constituted prior to July 1, 2005, as a result of this plan amendment.

2. Discussion:

The Union is seeking to slightly modify existing language in the General Provisions section of the pension agreement, to place a time specific period, i.e., the date of this arbitration award, on the maximum benefits received. The Town is seeking to eliminate the section in its entirety. The specific provision of the agreement provides a floor for benefits for current employees based on the provisions of a pre-July 1, 2005 pension plan, which we do not have before us.

The Town argues, “If allowed to remain as is, it interferes with these arbitration proceedings since it may restrict the arbitration panel from considering the Town’s last best offers on some of the outstanding issues.” (Town Brief at 21) The Town continues, “The Town’s proposal eliminates an unfair provision that is unfair and harmful to the parties’ ability to fully engage in collective bargaining and to the Town’s ability to effectively manage its financial resources.” (Town Brief at 22)

Since the Town last best offer removes an existing provision in the pension agreement, it has the burden of proof. In this instance, it has not met the burden. The Town asserts that the language proposed by the Union “may restrict the arbitration panel.” (Town Brief at 21, emphasis added) However, other than its general conclusory possibility, it provides no specifics by which to assess its contention. It is not in the public interest to have an arbitration panel change an existing provision without adequate evidence. Further, there is nothing in the Town’s arguments that suggests an adverse financial impact on the Town.

The Union seeks to continue, for the most part, the language of the prior pension agreement for employees hired prior to the date of this Award. It notes, “This language has been in the parties’ pension agreements for many years and provides protection against unilateral modifications to the plan.” (Union Brief at 28) It also notes that similar language is found in the Telecommunications Operator Pension Agreement and the Police Department’s Pension Agreement. (Union Brief at 28) The awards on all issues being decided by the Panel are not in conflict with this provision. Thus, the subordinate factors of the existing conditions of employment of the employee group and other condition of employment and the interests and welfare of the employee group also support the last best offer of the Union.

Based on the evidence, the Panel Majority concludes that the two priority factors and two applicable subordinate factors support the last best offer of the Union.

3. Award:

Based on a review of all the evidence and argument, in light of the statutory criteria, the Panel Majority awards the **Last Best Offer of the Union on Issue 5**. Based on the same statutory criteria, Mr. Romanow dissents.

X. ISSUE #6 – Article XII – Duration

1. Last Best Offers

Current Contract Language:

Either party may request the other party, in writing, to meet for the purpose of negotiating changes in the Town's Retirement Plan, to take effect no sooner than January 1, 2015, unless an earlier date is mutually agreed in writing.

Town's Last Best Offer:

The Retirement Plan shall be in effect from July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2020. No sooner than January 1, 2020 either party may request the other party, in writing, to meet for the purpose of negotiating changes in the Town's Retirement Plan, unless an earlier date is mutually agreed in writing.

Union's Last Best Offer:

Either party may request the other party, in writing, to meet for the purpose of negotiating changes in the Town's Retirement Plan, to take effect no sooner than January 1, ~~2015~~ 2022, unless an earlier date is mutually agreed in writing.

Discussion:

The Town's last best offer seeks to amend the Pension Agreement's duration to 2020. The Union's last best offer is for a duration ending 2022.

The Town's primary justification for its last best offer is threefold. First, the Town asserts that a shorter duration of five years will permit adjustments based on a changing economy. Second, the Town seeks to negotiate both contract and pension at the same time. Third, the Town notes that other unions have a lesser duration for the pension, e.g. the paraprofessionals and Teamsters, which represent the police dispatchers. (Town Brief at 24)

The Union, on the other hand, notes that the duration for fire pensions have traditionally been ten years; that the General Town Employees Coalition and the Town reached an agreement for a seven-year duration ending in 2022, which is the Union's last best offer. Additionally, the Union asserts, with its last best offers for all issues, it is "making a valiant effort to assist the Town with regard to its financial issues even considering that many of the issues relating to pension were brought upon by the Town." (Union Brief at 29-31, quoted portion at 30)

Based on a review of the arguments and evidence, in light of the statutory criteria, the Panel Majority finds the arguments of the Town more persuasive. This arbitration award is issued in May 2017. We understand that with the 2020 duration date the Pension Agreement will be renegotiated in a little over 3½ years. As the Union notes, such a short duration is an aberration from prior pension agreements.

However, we must balance the past duration of the plans with the rapidly changing economic uncertainty of the state budget, the reduction of funds to the Town and the corresponding economic and administrative consequences. (Town 3, Tab 67 and Town 4, Tabs 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10) In striking this balance, the public interest and the financial capability of the Town support its last best offer.

As has been repeatedly stated, a pension plan must be fair, competitive and sustainable. Each issue awarded by the Panel comports with this principle. Taken together, the Town's actuarial costs as a percent of payroll are being reduced by a total of 4.1%, un compounded, i.e., Issue 1 – 1%, Issue 2 – 1.1%, Issue 3 – 1.3% and Issue 4 – .7%. Clearly, this results from the conciliatory positions of both parties.

There is no question that a shorter duration will require negotiations to resume sooner than they have in the past. However, it is in the interest of the public and, by extension, the employee group to keep the plan sustainable.

As to the statutory factor of the existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups, we recognize, as did the Union, that the General Town Employees Coalition negotiated a 7-year pension duration to 2022. Noteworthy, they did this in 2015. (Town 3, Tab 38) And, reviewing the two unions cited by the Town, the Federation of Para-Educators agreed to a five-year duration, with an ending date of 2020, but did so in 2015. (Town 3, Tab 44), as did the police dispatchers. (Town 3, Tab 40) Both groups had a full five years under their new agreement. The duration of this Agreement commences July 1, 2015, so technically, this Agreement is for five years. However, as referenced above, the non-retroactive period of the plan is less than the full five years of the comparative plans. It is also for a period less than the police agreement. Thus, the subordinate factor of existing conditions of employment of the employee group and those of similar groups supports the last best offer of the Union. But, it does not outweigh the findings under the priority factors.

Award:

Based on a review of all the evidence and argument, in light of the statutory criteria, the Panel Majority awards the **Last Best Offer of the Town on Issue 6**. Based on the same statutory criteria, Mr. DiScipio dissents.

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PREAMBLE

1. WHEREAS, the Town of East Hartford, Connecticut (the "Town"), established the Retirement System for Employees of the Town of East Hartford (the "Plan") for eligible employees, effective June 27, 1941, and has subsequently been amended from time to time.
2. WHEREAS, the Retirement Board, in accordance with its authority granted under the Ordinances of the Town of East Hartford, Connecticut and the Plan does hereby amended and restate the Plan in its entirety effective July 1, 2015, unless otherwise required by federal legislation or as set forth in the Plan.
3. NOW, THEREFORE, the Plan, as amended and restated effective July 1, 2015 is hereby adopted by the Retirement Board, amending and restating the Retirement Plan for Full-Time Firefighters of the Town of East Hartford. This Plan has been amended to incorporate changes made pursuant to collective bargaining and to comply with the following legislation: Tax Reform Act of 1986 (TRA '86), the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1986 (OBRA '86), the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1987 (OBRA '87), the Technical and Miscellaneous Revenue Act of 1988 (TAMRA), the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1989 (OBRA '89), the Unemployment Compensation Act of 1992 (UCA '92), the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993 (OBRA '93), the Family and Medical Leave Act, the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA), the Small Business Job Protection Act of 1996 (SBJPA '96) and the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 (TRA '97).
4. Each provision in this revised document is deemed to be effective as of the effective date required by each respective and applicable law unless otherwise stated in the Plan. Unless otherwise stated herein, the rights of Employees who terminated service on or before June 30, 2015, shall be governed by the terms of the Plan and/or applicable collective bargaining agreement in effect at the time of termination of service.
5. This Plan is intended to be a governmental plan under Section 414(d) of the Internal Revenue Code and "qualified" as such under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

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ARTICLE I - DEFINITIONS

6. Section 1. The term "Dependents" shall mean either item (a) or item (b), whichever is applicable, subject to item (c):
7. (a) the surviving widow of a deceased Employee of the Fire Department of the Town of East Hartford, during her legal status as such. The term "widow" shall mean the surviving spouse of a Firefighter who shall have been married to him and living with him as his wife at the time of his death, if he dies while in active service; or who shall have been married to him prior to his retirement and who shall have been living with him as his wife at the time of his death, if he dies after retirement. Pension benefits will be payable to the surviving widow until her death or remarriage. No benefits will be payable to the surviving widow if there has been a final decree of divorce at the time of the Employee's death.
8. (b) if there is no widow - the dependent child or children of the deceased Employee. The term "dependent child or children" shall mean any unmarried child under the age of 18, or over said age if: (1) physically or mentally incapacitated from engaging in gainful employment, or (2) is a full-time undergraduate student at an accredited college or university. It shall not include any child born to a Firefighter more than nine months after his retirement from active service, but shall include natural children, adopted children, stepchildren and foster children living with the Firefighter at the time of such employee's death or retirement from active service.
9. (c) if there is more than one child entitled to receive benefits, such sum shall be divided equally among them. Payments due to such child or children shall be made to their legal guardian, or, if they have no legal guardian, to such other person to expend for them as the Retirement Board may direct. Any monthly payments made to any surviving widow shall cease upon her death or remarriage, and any such payment or portion therefore due any child shall cease upon the date when she or he ceases to qualify for such payment in accordance with the requirements herein before provided, and such portion of such payment shall be divided equally among the remaining eligible children, if any.
10. Section 2. The term "Employee" shall mean a full-time active bargaining unit member in the service of the Town of East Hartford's Fire Department.¹
11. Section 3. The term "Retired Employee" shall mean a former Employee continuously employed by the Employer until the commencement of a Pension who meets the requirements to receive a Normal or Disability pension from the Employer and who is receiving a Pension provided for hereunder.
12. Section 4. The term "Employer" shall mean the Town of East Hartford.
13. Section 5. The term "Plan Year" shall mean the 12 months from July_1st of any year to June 30th of

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the following year, both dates inclusive.

14. Section 6.
15. (a) For Employees hired before December 31, 1994, "Final Average Salary" shall mean the Employees' average annual pay, including overtime, holiday, longevity payments, and vacation pay for the 36 consecutive months of service based upon the Plan Year with the Employer which give the highest average. Final Average Salary shall also include any deferred salary or deferred wages that are considered annual salary or pay/wages during the period used to determine Final Average Salary. In addition, Final Average Salary shall also include any lump sum resulting from unused accrued terminal/sick leave and unused vacation subject to the maximums contained in the collective bargaining agreement.
16. (b) For Employees hired after January 1, 1995, "Final Average Salary" shall mean the Employees' average annual pay, including overtime, holiday, longevity payments, and vacation pay for the 36 consecutive months of service based upon the Plan Year, with the Employer which give the highest average. "Final Average Salary" shall also include any deferred salary or deferred wages that are considered annual salary or pay/wages during the period used to determine "Final Average Salary".
17. Section 7. The effective date of the Retirement System was originated by the State Legislature on June 27, 1941; however, as used hereafter, the term "Effective Date" shall mean July 1, 2015.
18. Section 8. The term "Insurance Company" shall mean the Aetna Life Insurance Company, or any legal reserve life insurance company organized or incorporated under the laws of any one of the United States of America and duly licensed in the State of Connecticut.
19. Section 9. The term "Interest" shall mean interest at the rate determined from time to time by the Retirement Board, and shall be substantially that which is earned net after expenses on the Retirement Fund, compounded annually on the last day of the Plan Year.
20. Section 10. The term "Permanently and Totally Disabled" shall mean that an Employee is physically or mentally unable, as a result of bodily injury or disease, to engage in or perform the regular duties of any position in the Fire Department, and such disability was not the result of the Employee's own willful misconduct and will be permanent and continuous for the remainder of his life. For the purposes of this Retirement System, willful misconduct shall be construed to include, but is not limited to, the following events:
 21. (a) disability resulting from an intentionally self-inflicted injury.
 22. (b) disability which was contracted, suffered or incurred while the Employee was engaged in or resulted from having engaged in a felonious enterprise.
23. Further, no disability benefits will be payable if such disability results from service in the Armed Forces of any country for which a service connected government disability is payable.

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24. Section 11. The term "Retirement Fund" shall mean the fund derived from contributions made as herein provided for the payment of Pension benefits to Retired Employees under this Retirement System.
25. Section 12. The term "Retirement Board" shall mean the Board herein created for the administration of the Retirement System. The Board shall consist of 5 members, not more than 3 of whom shall belong to any one political party as follows: A member of the Town Council; the Town Treasurer; and 3 citizens of the Town of East Hartford, 1 of whom shall be a member of the Retirement System as selected by a coalition of the various bargaining groups of the Town. All members, except the Town Treasurer, shall be appointed by the Mayor, with the consent of the Town Council. The Town Treasurer and the member representing the Town Council shall be appointed for a term of 2 years; the other 3 members shall be appointed for terms of 5 years, and their respective successors shall be appointed for 5 year terms; provided, the term of office of each member shall continue until his successor shall be appointed and shall have qualified. In the event of a vacancy on said Board, such vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as the member so to be succeeded was appointed or elected. In no event shall any person remain a member of said Board except during the time he continues to be a member of the Board or body from which he was appointed or elected. The members of the Retirement Board shall serve without compensation. The Board shall make bylaws and regulations not inconsistent with the law; shall employ such actuarial, medical, clerical and other services as may be necessary for the proper operation of the Retirement System and shall do all things necessary and proper toward carrying out the purpose for which the Retirement System was created. The Board shall submit annually to the Town Council a schedule of its estimated expenses necessary for the administration of this Retirement System, and all such expenses of administration shall be paid by the Town. The Board shall be the Trustee of the funds herein created and shall have full control and management thereof, with power to invest and reinvest the same in accordance with the laws of the state governing the investment of trust funds. The Retirement Board may enter into a group annuity contract with any insurance company authorized to transact business in the State of Connecticut to insure the entire Retirement Plan or such portion thereof as the Board shall deem advisable; provided, any such contract, before actually being consummated, shall be approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Town Council.
26. Section 13. The Term "Retirement System" shall mean the plan of retirement and other benefits for Employees of the Town of East Hartford as set forth in and by this document and all subsequent amendments thereto.
27. Section 14. The term "Pension or Pensions" shall mean a payment made to a Retired Employee or his Dependent according to the provision of this Retirement System, other than a return of contributions with Interest.
28. Section 15. The term "Regular Compensation" shall mean the annual salary or wages of an Employee for services with the Town, including overtime, holiday, longevity payments and vacation pay. It shall also include any deferred salary or deferred wages that are considered annual salary or pay/wages during the period used to determine Final Average Salary.

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29. Effective for Employees hired on or after July 1, 1996, the amount of pay, for purposes of this section shall be limited to a maximum of \$150,000 in a calendar year, or such other amount as prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury pursuant to IRC §401(a)(17). In addition, Regular Compensation shall also include, only for Employees hired on or before December 31, 1994, any lump sum resulting from unused accrued terminal/sick leave and unused vacation (subject to the maximums contained in the collective bargaining agreement) when these items are included in the definition of Final Average Salary.
30. Section 16. The term "Service Connected Benefit" shall mean any benefit payable upon the death or disability of an Employee who dies or becomes disabled during the performance of essential duties pertaining to his employment by the Town.
31. Section 17. The term "Non-Service Connected Benefit" shall mean any benefit payable upon the death or disability of an Employee who dies or becomes disabled from causes not related to his employment by the Town.
32. Section 18. The term "Continuous Service" shall mean uninterrupted employment of an Employee with the Employer. Continuous Service with the Employer shall not be broken in the event of:
 33. (1) Absence with the consent of the Retirement Board during any period not in excess of one year, except that the Retirement Board may consent to extend the period of leave.
 34. (2) Absence from work because of occupational injury or disease incurred as a result of employment with the Employer, for which absence an Employee shall be entitled to Workers' Compensation payments.
35. In interpreting this section, the Employer will apply uniform rules in a like manner to all Employees under similar circumstances.
36. An Employee shall not receive Credited Service in the case of the period of absence set forth in paragraph (1) of the above section, but shall retain Credited Service accrued prior to such absence. Upon return to employment after an approved absence, the Employee will again accrue Credited Service.
37. Military Service. The Retirement Plan will grant Credited Service and years of vesting service in accordance with the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act of 1994 (USERRA) for a Participant who was an Employee immediately before the commencement of military service as defined in USERRA, provided such Participant returns to employment with the Town within the "Required Period" of time set forth in paragraphs (2)(A) through (D) below. Credited Service shall only be granted if the Participant fulfills the requirements of paragraph Section 1.02(c)(3).
 38. (2) Required Period. Under USERRA, the "Required Period" depends on the length of Military Service. In general, the Required Period is:
 39. (A) one day after a Participant's Military Service ends (if such service was less than 31 7

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- days);
40. (B) 14 days after a Participant's Military Service ends (if such service was more than 30, but less than 181 days); and
41. (C) 90 days after a participant's Military Service ends (if such service was more than 180 days).
42. (D) If a Participant is hospitalized for or recovering from an illness or injury that was incurred or aggravated during Military Service, USERRA requires that such Participant register for reemployment with the Town as soon as he has recovered. Except as otherwise provided by USERRA, this recovery period cannot exceed two years.
43. (3) A Participant who enters the Armed Forces of the United States for a period of not more than five years (consecutive or individual years), is separated from active duty under conditions other than a dishonorable discharge, and returns to or makes himself available for work within the period specified in Section 1.02(c)(2)(A)-(D), shall be granted not to exceed one year of Credited Service for vesting purposes only in any one Calendar Year, up to a maximum of five years of Credited Service for vesting purposes, for such active duty in the Armed Forces.
44. (4) A Participant returning from military service who meets the requirements of Section 1.02(c)(1)-(2) shall have the right to make up his Employee Contributions and thereby receive Credited Service for benefit accrual purposes equal to his period of military service, to a maximum of five years of Credited Service. Such Participant must notify the Retirement Board upon reemployment of his desire to repay his Employee Contributions. Such Contributions shall be made either in a lump sum payment or on a post-tax basis over a period equal to the lesser of (1) three times his military service or (2) five years. The amount of Employee Contributions owed to the Plan shall be equal to—
45. (A) the Employee contribution rate in effect immediately before the commencement of military service, multiplied by
46. (B) the Employee's Regular Compensation for the preceding 12- month period prior to his military service, multiplied by
47. (C) the number of years and months of military service, to a maximum of five years;
plus
48. (D) compounded interest at the rate of four (4%) percent annually.
49. (5) To the extent required by USERRA, a Participant must inform the Town in writing before entering Military Service to be eligible for years of Credited Service for vesting purposes as described above.
50. Section 19. The term "Credited Service" shall mean the number of full years of Continuous Service and fractions thereof to the nearest completed month with the Employer, as determined by the Retirement Board, completed by the Employee from the date he is included in the Retirement System, as determined in Article III hereof, to the earlier of his date of termination of employment, or his actual retirement date. An Employee will not receive Credited Service for any period for which he is eligible hereunder if he does not make the necessary Employee contributions as described below in Article II.

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51. A Participant may purchase additional years of Credited Service for military service that commenced prior to his employment with the Town as follows:
52. (a) Military Service Buyback -- Prior to Commencement of Employment with the Town. An Employee may purchase up to four (4) years of military service, defined as active duty service for the United States Government that occurred prior to his commencement of employment with the Town.
53. (1) The cost to purchase such Credited Service shall be 13% of the annual base salary at the time of the request.
54. (b) The following terms and conditions shall apply to such purchase:
55. (1) There will be three (3) window periods within which a member may purchase military service time:
56. (A) Within ninety (90) calendar days of initial date of hire;
57. (B) Within ninety (90) calendar days from his date of vesting; or
58. (C) Within ninety (90) calendar days from the Town Council ratification of this signed agreement
59. (2) The purchased military leave cannot be used to establish a vested right to a pension benefit nor may it be used to establish eligibility for a Normal Retirement Pension.
60. (3) A participant may elect to pay the total cost of the purchased military leave time over three (3) years from his/her election to purchase time.
61. (4) Payroll contributions shall be made on a pre-tax basis. Direct payment to the Town shall be treated as post-tax contributions.
62. (c) In the event that a Participant who has purchased military service under this provision terminates employment with the Town prior to attaining Vested Status, or dies, a return of all of his contributions attributable to the purchase of such military service shall be returned to him, or his beneficiary, with interest in accordance with the current rate specified in the Plan.
63. Section 20. The term "Actuary" shall mean a member of the Society of Actuaries, or an organization employing such a member, appointed and compensated by the Retirement Board to render actuarial services with respect to the Retirement System.
64. Section 21. The term "Vested Employee" shall mean any former Employee who terminates employment and who subsequently qualifies for a deferred Pension under Article VII, Section 2 of this Retirement Plan.

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ARTICLE II - CONTRIBUTIONS

65. Section 1. Issue 1
66. Effective July 1, 1999, pursuant to the provisions of Section 414(h)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, the Employer shall pick-up and pay the contributions which would otherwise be payable under this Section by each Employee for Service on and after July 1, 1999. The contributions so picked-up shall be treated as Employer contributions for purposes of determining the amounts of federal and state income taxes to be withheld from each Employee's Regular Compensation.
67. The Employee's contributions picked-up by the Employer shall be paid from the same source of funds used for the payment of compensation to Employees. Each Employee's Regular Compensation shall be reduced by an amount equal to the amount of the Employee's Contributions picked-up by the Employer. The contributions picked-up by the Employer shall be deposited by the Employer into the Plan.
68. Employee Contributions picked-up by the Employer shall be credited to a separate account within each Employee's individual contribution account, so that amounts contributed by the Employee before July 1, 1999 may be distinguished from the Employee's Contributions picked-up by the Employer on and after July 1, 1999.
69. Section 2. Contributions of the Employer - The Retirement Board shall, at least once every 2 years, be required to have an actuarial valuation by an Actuary of the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System and of the required contributions from the Employer which, in addition to contributions of the Employees, will be adequate to finance the benefits under the Retirement System.
70. On the basis of each such valuation, the Employer shall pay each year to the Retirement Board an amount which will meet the actuarial cost of current service, and, until it is amortized, the unfunded accrued liability. The annual appropriation by the Employer for each of the 25 Plan Years, beginning October 1, 1987, shall be the sum of the normal cost for the year and the annual payment that would be required, on a level basis, to amortize the unfunded accrued liability over 25 years from October 1, 1987. The appropriation for each Plan Year thereafter shall be the normal cost for the year.
71. Any proposal which will change the benefits payable or Employee contributions required under the Retirement System shall be accompanied by an estimate by the Actuary of the additional appropriations by the Employer which will be required to finance the additional normal cost and to amortize, on a level basis, the additional accrued liability over 30 years from the effective date of the change.

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ARTICLE III - ELIGIBILITY

72. Section 1. An Employee who was an eligible Employee in the Retirement System on July 1, 2015, will remain an eligible Employee thereafter, subject to the provisions of this Retirement System.
73. Section 2. An Employee who enters the service of the Employer on or after July 1, 2015 will become an eligible Employee if the following conditions are met:
74. (a) under age 45 - as a condition of employment, it is mandatory that an Employee becomes covered under the Retirement System within 3 months after his employment commences.
75. (b) he has reached his 45th birthday - as a condition of employment, it is not mandatory that an Employee becomes covered under the Retirement System; however, he must apply within 3 months of entering the service of the Town. If such Employee does not apply then, he must do so within 2 years of his employment date, and in order to be credited with such service, he must pay all back contributions with Interest thereon.
76. (c) All Employees must make their required Employee contributions while eligible to do so. No credit will be granted during any period when the Employee does not make the necessary contributions to the Retirement System.

ARTICLE IV - AMOUNT OF PENSION

77. Section 1. Issue 2
78. Section 2. Issue 3
79. Section 3. The minimum monthly Pension for an Employee who retires on or after the Effective Date on his Normal Retirement Date, in accordance with Article VI, will equal one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) per month.
80. Section 4. Issue 4
81. Section 4.01 In General
82. This Retirement Plan shall follow the requirements of IRC §415 as applicable to government plans within the meaning of IRC §414(d).
83. Section 4.02. Annual Benefit.

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84. The Annual Benefit of a Participant hereunder (adjusted to an Actuarially Equivalent straight life annuity as defined in Section 4.05(d) shall not at any time within the Limitation Year exceed the lesser of—
85. (a) \$90,000, as that amount shall be adjusted from time to time, or
86. (b) 100 percent of the Participant's average Compensation for his high 3 years
87. Effective July 1, 1995, subsection (b) shall not apply.
88. Section 4.03. Adjustment for Less than 10 Years of Participation.
89. (a) In the case of a Participant who has less than 10 years of participation in this Plan, the \$90,000 limitation set forth in Section 4.02 shall be multiplied by a fraction, the numerator of which is years of participation in this Plan and the denominator of which is 10. This shall also apply to the Compensation limitation in Section 4.02 except that the numerator shall be years of service with the Town rather than years of participation in this Plan.
90. (b) The limitations of section 4.03(a), above, however, do not apply if the Pension amounts do not exceed \$10,000 for the current or prior Plan Year and the Participant has not been covered at any time by a defined contribution plan to which the Town contributed on his or her behalf.
91. Section 4.04. Maximum Benefit Limitation Definitions.
92. For purposes of this Article XII, the following definitions shall apply:
93. (a) "Pension" shall mean an annual benefit payable at Normal Retirement Age as a straight life annuity with no ancillary benefits or an annuity payable in a joint and survivor payment form where the Participant's spouse is the Joint Pensioner. A benefit payable in any other form shall be converted to the actuarial equivalent of a straight life annuity, for purposes of applying these limits, based on a five percent (5%) interest assumption. Other required adjustments are provided for below.
94. (b) "Compensation" shall mean all earnings reported on W-2 forms completed by the Town in respect to the Plan Year specified.
95. (c) "Annual Benefit" shall mean the benefit to which the Participant would be entitled to at his or her Normal Retirement Date assuming he or she continues employment until such date and that all other relevant facts used to determine benefits under the Plan remain constant as of the current Limitation Year for all future Limitation Years.
96. (d) The term "Limitation Year" shall mean a Plan Year.
97. (e) The term "Qualified Participant" shall mean that term as defined in Section 4.05, below.
98. Section 4.05 Adjustment for Early or Late Commencement of Benefits.
99. (a) In General. If the annual pension benefit of a Participant begins before age 62, as

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described in IRC §415(b)(8) the \$90,000 limitation set forth in Section 4.02, above shall be reduced so that it is equivalent to such a benefit beginning at age 62. The reduction of this paragraph shall not reduce the limitation of Section 4.05(a), below—

100. (1) \$75,000 if the benefit begins at or after age 55, or if the benefit begins before age 55, the equivalent of the \$75,000 limitation for age 55.
101. (b) In the case of a “qualified Member”, the limitations of Section 4.05(a) shall not apply. A qualified Member means a Member:
 102. (1) in a defined benefit plan which is maintained by a State or political subdivision therefore; and
 103. (2) with respect to whom the period of service taken into account in determining the amount of the benefit under such defined benefit plan includes at least 15 years of service of the Member; and
 104. (3) is a full-time employee of any police department or fire department which is organized and operated by the State or political subdivision maintaining such defined benefit plan to provide police protection, firefighting services for any area within the jurisdiction of such State or political subdivision; or
 105. (4) is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States.
106. (c) Benefits Beginning after Age 55. If the annual pension benefit of a Participant begins after age 65, the \$90,000 limitation set forth in 4.02 above shall be increased so that it is equivalent to such a benefit beginning at age 65.
107. (d) Actuarial Equivalence. Actuarial Equivalence under this Section 4.05 shall be determined using a five percent (5%) interest assumption, and the term “\$90,000” shall include any higher amounts prescribed pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code for purposes of these limitations.
108. (e) In the case of disability or survivor benefits provided under the Plan, the limitations of Section 4.03(a) and 4.05(a) shall not apply to:
 109. (1) income received from the Plan as a pension, annuity, or similar Pension as the result of the recipient becoming disabled by reason of personal injuries or sickness, or
 110. (2) amounts received from a governmental plan by the beneficiaries, survivors or the estate of an Employee as the result of the death of the Employee.
111. Section 4.06 Combined Plan Limits.
112. (a) If a Participant also participates in another defined benefit plan of the Town obligated

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to contribute under this Plan, and such Plan is a qualified plan under IRC §401(a), such plan shall be combined with this Plan in accordance with Treas. Reg. §1.415-8(e) for purposes of determining compliance with the limitations of IRC §415(b).

113. (b) If a Participant also participates in a defined contribution plan of the Town obligated to contribute under this Plan, and such Plan is a qualified plan under IRC §401(a), such plan will be combined with this Plan in accordance with Treas. Reg. §1.415-8(e) for purposes of determining compliance with the limitations under IRC §415(e).
114. (c) Effective for Limitation Years beginning on and after July 1, 2000, Section 4.06(b) shall no longer apply.
115. Section 4.07 Protection of Prior Benefits.
116. For any year before 1986, the limitations prescribed by IRC §415 as in effect before enactment of the Tax Reform Act of 1986 and all subsequent legislation shall apply, and no Pension earned under this Retirement Plan prior to 1986 shall be reduced on account of the provisions of Sections 4.03 through 4.08 if it would have satisfied those limitations under that prior law.
117. Section 4.08 Application of Maximum Limitations.
118. (a) The benefit paid under this Retirement Plan shall not exceed the limitations set forth in Section 4.02.
119. (b) If a Participant on his or her annuity starting date is not eligible for full monthly benefits under this Retirement Plan because of the operation of Section 4.02, the monthly benefit thereafter shall be recalculated annually until the Participant is receiving a full monthly benefit under the Retirement Plan's terms without the operation of this Section 4.08. Each such recalculation shall be based on this Section 4.08 with any applicable adjustment to reflect cost of living-increases as permitted by the Treasury Regulations.
120. Section 5. The amount of Pension to be provided for a terminated Employee who has met the vesting requirement in Section 2 of Article VII will be the amount of Pension accrued to the date of his termination using Final Average Salary and Credited Service to such date. Such Pension shall be based on the Retirement Plan provisions in effect at the time the Employee terminated his Employment with his Employer.

ARTICLE V - DISABILITY PAYMENTS

121. Section 1. An Employee shall be deemed to be Permanently and Totally Disabled within the meaning of this Retirement System only if the Retirement Board, in its sole and absolute discretion, shall determine on the basis of medical evidence that the Employee is Permanently

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and Totally Disabled.

122. Section 2. Employees applying for disability retirement shall be required to submit to examination, at the expense of the Retirement Board, by at least 2 impartial physicians or psychiatrists selected by the Retirement Board, and such Employees may be required to submit to re-examination no more than once in each 12 month period. Should the results of such examination indicate that an Employee retired on account of a disability, is physically and mentally able to perform the regular duties required of such Employee, then such Employee, at the option of the Retirement Board, may remain retired or may be returned to duty at the same rank held by such Employee at the time of his disability retirement and, upon returning to duty, such Employee will be credited with all service time for the period of his disability retirement, provided he makes payment of the amount he would have been required to contribute to the Retirement System during the period of his disability, with Interest thereon. All presently disabled Employees of the Fire Department shall be governed by the foregoing.
123. Section 3. Service Connected Disability - Any Employee covered under this Retirement System who becomes Permanently and Totally Disabled during the performance of essential duties pertaining to his employment shall be eligible to retire and receive a Service Connected Disability Pension equal to fifty percent (50%) of the disabled Employee's Final Average Salary or his annual rate of Regular Compensation at the time of such disability (whichever is greater) if the Employee has completed less than 20 years of Credited Service. If the Employee has completed 20 or more years of Credited Service at his date of disability, the amount of the Service Connected Disability Pension shall be determined in the same manner as his Normal Pension as described in Article IV, Section 1 hereof using Credited Service and Final Average Salary or Regular Compensation as of the date of disability. In no event shall payments under this section, together with any benefits awarded under the Connecticut Workers' Compensation Act, exceed one hundred percent (100%) of the Final Average Salary or the Regular Compensation being paid to the disabled Employee at the time of his disability.
124. Section 4. Non-Service Connected Disability - Any actively employed Employee under this Retirement System who has 5 years of Credited Service and becomes Permanently and Totally Disabled shall be eligible to retire and receive a Non-Service Connected Disability Pension. The amount of such Non-Service Connected Disability Pension shall be equal to the disabled Employee's accrued benefit at the time of such disability as determined in the same manner as his Normal Pension as described in Article IV, Section 1, but based on Credited Service to the date of his disability subject to a minimum of twenty percent (20%) of his Final Average Salary.
125. Section 5. Cessation of Disability - Such disability payments will end immediately on the date the Employee ceases to be Permanently and Totally Disabled by death or recovery.

ARTICLE VI - RETIREMENT DATE

126. Section 1. The Normal Retirement Date of an Employee is the day of the month named

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by the Employee on which he has completed 25 years of Credited Service with the Employer.

127. Section 2. An Employee will not be permitted to work as a full-time permanent Employee of the Town after he has reached his 65th birthday. An Employee who reaches his 65th birthday before completing 25 years of Credited Service with the Employer will be eligible to retire when he reaches his 65th birthday, provided he has completed at least 10 years of Credited Service. Such Employee's Pension shall be determined as provided in Article IV, Section 1. All Pension payments shall become due and payable on the last day of each calendar month, provided the initial Pension payment shall be computed as the pro rata of the amount of Pension corresponding to the fraction of the month elapsed since the effective date of retirement.
128. Section 3. If a Retired Employee is re-employed by the Employer, his Pension shall cease with the last payment due prior to his re-employment. Pension payments shall again become payable following subsequent termination of employment.

ARTICLE VII - TERMINATION OF SERVICE

129. Section 1. An Employee who terminates employment before he has completed at least 10 years of Credited Service with the Employer will lose his eligibility for Retirement System benefits; and he will receive his Employee contributions with Interest up to his date of termination of employment.
130. Section 2. An Employee who has completed at least 10 years of Credited Service and who does not elect to receive his Employee contributions with Interest may elect to receive a Pension equal to the amount determined from Section 1 and 5 of Article IV. The Pension will be provided when the terminated Employee would have normally been eligible to retire as determined in Section 1 of Article VI had he continued in employment with the Employer rather than terminated his employment. Terminated vested Employees who die before or after retirement will receive a Death Benefit, as determined in Section 4 of Article VIII, namely, the return of their contributions with Interest up to their date of death or retirement, whichever is earlier, less any Pension payments received after retirement.
131. Section 3. An Employee who terminates service after the completion of at least 10 years of Credited Service will not be eligible for the Non-Service Connected Disability Benefit or the Non-Service Connected Death Benefit.

ARTICLE VIII - DEATH BENEFITS

132. Section 1. Service Connected Death - Upon the death of an Employee who dies during the performance of essential duties pertaining to his employment, his Dependents shall receive a

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Service Connected Death Benefit equal to fifty percent (50%) of such deceased Employee's Final Average Salary or his annual rate of Regular Compensation (whichever is greater) if the deceased Employee had completed less than 20 years of Credited Service. If the deceased Employee had completed 20 or more years of Credited Service at his date of death, the amount of the Service Connected Death Benefit shall be determined in the same manner as his Normal Pension as described in Article IV, Section 1 hereof using Credited Service and Final Average Salary or Regular Compensation as of the date of death. This benefit will also be payable to the Dependents of an Employee who dies as a result of a Service Connected Disability Benefit, the total benefits payable under this section to the deceased Employee's Dependents during their compensable period, together with any benefits awarded under the Connecticut Workers' Compensation Act, shall not exceed one hundred percent (100%) of the Regular Compensation being paid to the deceased Employee at the time of his death.

133. Section 2. Non-Service Connected Death - Upon the death of an actively employed Employee who dies from causes not related to his employment with his Employer, and who has completed at least 5 years of Credited Service, his Dependents will receive a Death Benefit equal to the deceased Employee's accrued benefit at the time of his death, as determined in the same manner as his Normal Pension, as described in Article IV, Section 1 hereof, but based on Credited Service on the date of his death, subject to a minimum of twenty percent (20%) of his Final Average Salary.
134. Section 3. Post-Retirement Death - Upon the death of a Retired Employee, his Dependents will receive a Death Benefit equal to seventy-five (75%) of the Pension the deceased Employee was receiving at his date of death. If the Retired Employee and his Dependents should die before the total of the Retired Employee's contributions with Interest have been received by the Retired Employee and his Dependents, the excess of such contributions and Interest will be payable to the estate of the last surviving Dependent.
135. Section 4. Death Benefits - No Dependents - Upon the death of a Retired Employee who has no Dependents, his beneficiary will receive a Death Benefit equal to such deceased Employee's contributions with Interest less any Pension benefits received by the Employee prior to his death. If there is no named beneficiary, any such Death Benefits will be paid to the estate of the deceased Employee.
136. Section 5. Beneficiaries - An Employee may name a beneficiary to receive the Death Benefit due on or after his death, as described in Section 4 above, by written request filed with the Employer. With the consent of the Employer, he may name 2 or more co-beneficiaries or successor beneficiaries. If an Employee names 2 or more persons as beneficiaries, such persons or their survivors will be considered co-beneficiaries unless he provides otherwise. An Employee may change any named beneficiary from time to time by written request filed with the Employer. The consent of his beneficiary is not required to any naming or change thereof. Such request is effective when the Employee signs it whether or not he is living at the time the request is received by the Town, but without prejudice for any payments made before receipt of the request.

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ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENT TO THE RETIREMENT SYSTEM

137. Section 1. This Retirement System is established and maintained for the exclusive benefit of Employees of the Employer and their beneficiaries. Subject to this limitation, any provisions of this Retirement System may be amended by the Employer at any time if, with respect to payments resulting from Pensions provided before the effective date of the amendment, the amendment does not reduce the amount of any payment, or the term of monthly payments, or delay the due date of any payment.
138. Section 2. Any provision of this Retirement System may be amended in any respect, without regard to the above limitation, if the amendment is required for qualification or continued qualification of the Retirement System under income tax law, or is necessary for this Retirement System to meet the requirements of any other applicable law.
139. Section 3. Neither the consent of the Employee nor that of any other payee is required for any amendment to the Retirement System made as provided above.

ARTICLE X - ADMINISTRATION OF PLAN

140. Section 1. Annual Report. The Retirement Board shall, on or before March 31st of each year, file with the Town Council an Annual Report showing the financial condition of the Retirement System as of the end of the last completed fiscal year, including an actuarial valuation of assets and liabilities, and setting forth such other facts, recommendations and data as may be of value to the members of the Retirement System of the Town of East Hartford.
141. Section 2. If there shall arise any misunderstanding or ambiguity concerning the meaning of any of the provisions of the Retirement System, the Retirement Board shall have the sole right to construe such provisions, and the Retirement Board's decision shall be final. The Retirement Board may establish such rules and regulations supplementing the Retirement System as it considers desirable.
142. Section 3. The finding of facts by the Retirement board as to matters relating to an Employee's employment record are binding on him for the purposes of the Retirement System. The Retirement System shall confer no right upon any Employee to be retained as an Employee by the Employer.
143. Section 4. All persons shall promptly furnish information and proofs to the Retirement Board as to any and all facts which the Retirement Board may reasonably require concerning any person affected by the terms of the Retirement System (including date of birth and satisfactory proof, by personal endorsement of the pension checks or otherwise, of the survival of any payee to the due date of any pension payment).

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144. Section 5. Each Employee who has terminated service with the Employer and who has met the vesting requirements in accordance with Article VII, will inform the Retirement Board of his changes of address. Such terminated Employees must inform the Retirement Board of their desire to retire and must make an appropriate application. All notices to any person from the Retirement Board will be sent to the last address of such person which the Retirement Board has on record, and the Retirement Board has no further obligation to such person in the event any such communication, sent by registered or certified mail, is not received by the person.
145. Section 6. If any fact relating to an Employee or any other payee has been misstated, the correct fact may be used to determine the amount of Pension payable to him or such other payee. If overpayments or underpayments have been made because of such incorrect statement, the amount of any future payments may be appropriately adjusted.

ARTICLE XI - GENERAL PROVISIONS

146. Section 1. An application for a Pension must be made in writing on a form and in a manner prescribed by the Retirement Board and shall be filed with the Retirement Board at least 2 months in advance of the final month for which benefits are payable.
147. Section 2. A single sum payment in an actuarially equivalent amount may be made in lieu of monthly payments if the amount of each monthly Pension payment would be less than \$20.00.
148. Section 3. No payee may sell, assign, discount, or pledge as collateral for a loan or as a security for the performance of an obligation or for any other purpose, any payment due to him. If the payee for any payment is a minor or incompetent person, payment may be made to the person, or persons, caring for or supporting such payee, in full discharge of all obligations, as determined by the Retirement Board.
149. Section 4. There will be no obligation to make any payment to a payee herein unless the payer has received proof that the payee was living on the due date of the payment. If such proof is not received within 7 years after the due date of the payment, and if no proof of the death of the payee is received during such 7 year period, the obligations of the payer as to the payment and as to the Pension payments, if any, from which the payments results will be the same as if the payee had died immediately before the due date of the payment.
150. Section 5. The use of the singular herein shall be deemed to include the plural, the use of the plural shall include the singular, and all references to gender shall be interchangeable where the context so requires.
151. Section 6. **Issue 5**

ARTICLE XIII - ROLLOVER PROVISIONS

153. Section 1.1 Direct Rollovers

154. This section applies to distributions made on or after July 1, 1993. Notwithstanding any provisions of the Plan to the contrary that would otherwise limit a Distributee's election under this Section, a Distributee may elect, at the time and in the manner prescribed by the Retirement Board in accordance with applicable regulations, to have any portion of an Eligible Rollover Distribution paid directly to an Eligible Retirement Plan specified by the Distributee in a Direct Rollover.
155. (a) A Distributee who is entitled to elect a Direct Rollover with respect to all or any portion of a distribution, but who does not make any election shall be deemed to have rejected the Direct Rollover option.
156. (b) A Distributee who elects a Direct Rollover with respect to any Eligible Rollover Distribution that is one in a series of installment payments made at least annually over a period of less than 10 years shall be deemed to have made the same election with respect to all subsequent Eligible Rollover Distributions in the series unless and until the Distributee changes the election. A change of election shall be accomplished by notifying the Retirement Board of the change in the form and manner prescribed by the Retirement Board.
157. (c) Within a reasonable period of time before an Eligible Rollover Distribution is to be made, the Retirement Board shall provide to the Distributee an explanation of the right to elect a Direct Rollover and the federal tax withholding consequences of failing to elect a Direct Rollover. A Distributee who elects a Direct Rollover must provide all information that the Retirement Board may require to complete the Direct Rollover.
158. (d) For the purposes of this Section, the following definitions shall apply:
159. (1) An "Eligible Rollover Distribution" is any distribution of all or any portion of the balance of the credit of the Distributee, except that an Eligible Rollover Distribution does not include: any distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments (at least annually) made for the life (of the life expectancy) of the Distributee or the joint lives (of joint life expectancies) of the Distributee and the Distributee's designated beneficiary, or for a specific period of ten years or more; any distribution to the extent such distribution is required under Section 401(a)(9) of the Code; and the portion of any distribution that is not includable in gross income (determined without regard to the exclusion for net unrealized appreciation with respect to employer securities).
160. (2) A distribution of less than \$200 that would otherwise be an Eligible Rollover Distribution within the meaning of paragraph (d-1) shall not be an Eligible Rollover

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Distribution if it is reasonable to expect that all such distributions to the Distributee from the Plan during the same calendar year will total less than \$200.

161. (3) An "Eligible Retirement Plan" is an individual retirement account described in Section 408(a) of the Code, an individual retirement annuity described in Section 408(b) of the Code or a qualified trust described in Section 401(a) of the Code, that accepts the Distributee's Eligible Rollover Distribution. However, in the case of an Eligible Rollover Distribution to the surviving spouse, an Eligible Retirement Plan is an individual retirement account or individual retirement annuity.
162. (4) "Distributee" includes a Town or former Employee. In addition, the Employee's or former Employee's surviving spouse and the Employee's or former Employee's spouse or former spouse who is the alternate payee under a qualified domestic relations order, as defined in Section 414(p) of the Code, are Distributees with regard to the interest of the spouse or former spouse.
163. (5) A "Direct Rollover" is a payment by the Plan to the Eligible Retirement Plan specified by the Distributee.
164. *Section 1.2 Rollovers to the Plan*
165. In no event shall the Plan accept Eligible Rollovers from any source unless a reemployed Employee is making a repayment of his Employee Contributions.

ARTICLE XIV – Deferred Retirement Option Plan (DROP) / PARTIAL LUMP SUM OPTION (PLUS)

166. Section 1. The Deferred Retirement Option Plan will be offered only to employees employed on or after July 1, 2005. The DROP is intended to provide an alternative retirement option to employees who are eligible to retire. The Town and Local #1548 agree that the DROP and PLUS options are considered to be cost-neutral as confirmed by the Town's actuary (Segal Company).
167. Section 2. An employee, who is a member of the Retirement Plan for full-time employees of the Fire Department of the Town of East Hartford, upon completing his/her 25th year of Credited Service may elect the DROP at anytime up to and through the completion of his/her 29th year of Credited Service. The employee must provide the Town with at least 60 days advanced notice, in writing, that he/she has elected the DROP. No employees may elect the DROP after completion of his/her 29th year of Credited Service.
168. Section 3. Any employees electing DROP will be considered retired with respect to the Pension Plan but will not have separated from Town service. Notwithstanding any other provision within the Retirement Plan to the contrary, a member does not need to leave Town service to qualify for pension benefits as long as that member has elected

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DROP. The employees who have elected the DROP may remain in Town service at their current rank, with all the benefits of their Collective Bargaining Agreement, including promotional opportunities, through and including the completion of their DROP period.

169. Section 4. The DROP period is defined as the time after the employees have elected the DROP commencing on the date of the first payment to the DROP through the date that the member separates from Town service.
170. Section 5. No further pension benefits will accrue after the DROP effective date.
171. Section 6. When employees elect the DROP they will be entitled to all the benefits they would have received under the Normal Retirement provisions of the Retirement Plan (during the DROP period) with the following exceptions:
 172. (a) During the DROP period the employee's monthly pension payments will be made to the employee's separately designated DROP account established for the benefit of that member. During the DROP period, the monthly pension payments will be 96% of the monthly pension payment the employee was entitled to receive had the member retired without electing the DROP. Upon separation from Town service, the monthly pension payment shall increase to 100% of the monthly pension, as though the member had retired and not elected the DROP.
 173. (b) During the DROP period, the employees will continue to make the same employee contributions from earnings while employed with the Town as was in effect at the time the DROP was elected by such employee. These contributions are made to the pension fund, not the member's separate DROP plan account.
 174. (c) Commencement of the COLA waiting period is the date the employee physically separates from Town service, not the DROP date.
175. Section 7. Any member who has elected and commenced the DROP may not withdraw unless:
 176. (a) the member separates from Town service (see Section 9); or
 177. (b) the member applies in writing to the Retirement Board to seek permission to be released/withdraw from the DROP election and the Retirement Board grants that request, which decision will be final.
178. Section 8. The minimum length of DROP will be one (1) year and the maximum length of the DROP will be five (5) years. Upon electing the DROP the employees will select the length of his/her respective DROP. Military time purchased by a member shall be included in the calculation of the member's pension benefit under the Retirement Plan. (For example, an employee who has completed his 25th year of service may elect the

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DROP and purchase two (2) years of military service and, if so, shall receive credit for 27 years of service.) Under no circumstances will an employee be credited with more than 30 years of service.

179. Section 9. Any member who has elected the DROP may separate from Town service at anytime during the DROP period and such separation will mark the termination of the DROP period and the commencement of Normal Pension benefits at 100%. The maximum length of Town service for any member who has elected the DROP is defined as the completion of the 30th year of Credited Service. No member will be allowed to continue Town service after the completion of the 30th year of service.
180. Section 10. The Town has selected an Administrator through the Ordinance Bidding process to custody the funds for all members who elect the DROP. The choice between investment vehicles offered by the administrator shall be with the member. The cost of such custody administration will be paid for by members as an account charge. Upon completion of the DROP period, the member will be considered a retired employee and will receive non-adjusted payments (100% of their Normal Retirement benefits as accrued on the DROP effective date plus a lump sum equal to the DROP accumulation). The lump sum will be made available to the employee/member within a reasonable period of time after the member terminates service with the Town.
181. Section 11. When a member elects the DROP, their accrued terminal, sick and vacation leave payout will be included in the calculations of their final average salary as provided in the Retirement Plan. When the member elects the DROP the member will be paid for 50% of their contractually (the collective bargaining agreement) compensable accrued sick time at the commencement of the DROP and will be paid the remaining 50% of the accrued sick time when they separate from Town service. Sick leave accrual will be adjusted to reflect the 50% payout, leaving the other 50% of the max plus any overage. In the event insignificant accrued sick time is available to pay the remaining 50%, whatever balance is available at separation will be paid out at 50% and a corresponding retroactive adjustment to the final average salary calculation, which will impact the final pension amount paid to the retiree. Sick time in excess of any amount includable in the contractual buy-out provision shall be forfeited.
182. Section 12. Any member who elects the DROP shall not be eligible for the Plus Option.
183. Section 13. In lieu of receiving a pension in the form of an annuity, a employees may elect a Partial Lump Sum Option whereby a portion of his/her pension benefit will be paid as a lump sum benefit upon retirement from the Town. The amount of the lump shall be equal to 10% of the actuarial present value of the benefit as determined by the Plan's actuary, based upon actuarial factors in effect at the time of distribution to determine actual funding. The remaining portion of the employee's benefit shall be paid monthly for such employee's lifetime, in accordance with the Retirement Plan provisions. Upon the death of the

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
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

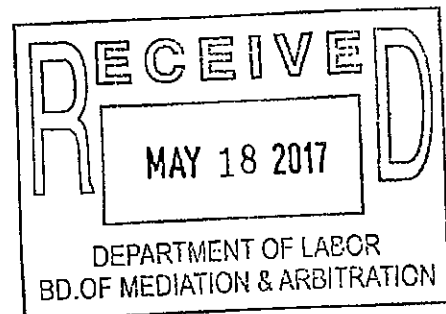

RE: Firefighter's Pension Contract Arbitration Award Costing

By way of this memo, attached please find a brief costing of the Firefighter's Pension Contract Arbitration Award.

The next Pension Plan Actuarial Analysis and accompanying FY 19 Pension Budget Estimate will be completed later this year and will include the contract changes noted below.

With respect to the four financial issues decided as part of the Fire Pension Arbitration Award, here is a brief synopsis and costing:

1. Issue one sets the pension contribution to 9%. This is worth \$123,000 annually.
2. Issue two leaves the pension multiplier at 2.5% per year for existing employees while new employees drop to 2.33%. Gradually, this is worth \$135,300 annually.
3. Issue three leaves the 1% COLA after their 5th year in retirement increasing to a 2% annual COLA in their 9th year of their retirement in place while new hires would receive a 1% annual COLA in their 7th year. Gradually, this is worth \$172,200.
4. Issue four institutes a maximum pension cap set at 100% of the employee base plus holiday pay and paramedic stipend for new hires. Gradually, this is worth \$86,100.

Total annual pension savings will top out at \$516,600 but because the majority of the savings are linked to new employees, this savings will come to fruition in 20 to 25 years.

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PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, the Town of East Hartford, Connecticut (the “Town”), established the Retirement System for Employees of the Town of East Hartford (the “Plan”) for eligible employees, effective June 27, 1941, and has subsequently been amended from time to time.

WHEREAS, the Retirement Board, in accordance with its authority granted under the Ordinances of the Town of East Hartford, Connecticut and the Plan does hereby amended and restate the Plan in its entirety effective July 1, ~~2005~~ **2015**, unless otherwise required by federal legislation or as set forth in the Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Plan, as amended and restated effective July 1, ~~2005~~ **2015** is hereby adopted by the Retirement Board, amending and restating the Retirement Plan for Full-Time Firefighters of the Town of East Hartford. This Plan has been amended to incorporate changes made pursuant to collective bargaining and to comply with the following legislation: Tax Reform Act of 1986 (TRA '86), the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1986 (OBRA '86), the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1987 (OBRA '87), the Technical and Miscellaneous Revenue Act of 1988 (TAMRA), the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1989 (OBRA '89), the Unemployment Compensation Act of 1992 (UCA '92), the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993 (OBRA '93), the Family and Medical Leave Act, the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA), the Small Business Job Protection Act of 1996 (SBJPA '96) and the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 (TRA '97).

Each provision in this revised document is deemed to be effective as of the effective date required by each respective and applicable law unless otherwise stated in the Plan. Unless otherwise stated herein, the rights of Employees who terminated service on or before June 30, ~~2005~~ **2015**, shall be governed by the terms of the Plan and/or applicable collective bargaining agreement in effect at the time of termination of service.

This Plan is intended to be a governmental plan under Section 414(d) of the Internal Revenue Code and “qualified” as such under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE I - DEFINITIONS

Section 1. The term "Dependents" shall mean either item (a) or item (b), whichever is applicable, subject to item (c):

- (a) the surviving widow of a deceased Employee of the Fire Department of the Town of East Hartford, during her legal status as such. The term "widow" shall mean the surviving spouse of a Firefighter who shall have been married to him and living with him as his wife at the time of his death, if he dies while in active service; or who shall have been married to him prior to his retirement and who shall have been living with him as his wife at the time of his death, if he dies after retirement. Pension benefits will be payable to the surviving widow until her death or remarriage. No benefits will be payable to the surviving widow if there has been a final decree of divorce at the time of the Employee's death.
- (b) if there is no widow - the dependent child or children of the deceased Employee. The term "dependent child or children" shall mean any unmarried child under the age of 18, or over said age if: (1) physically or mentally incapacitated from engaging in gainful employment, or (2) is a full-time undergraduate student at an accredited college or university. It shall not include any child born to a Firefighter more than nine months after his retirement from active service, but shall include natural children, adopted children, stepchildren and foster children living with the Firefighter at the time of such employee's death or retirement from active service.
- (c) if there is more than one child entitled to receive benefits, such sum shall be divided equally among them. Payments due to such child or children shall be made to their legal guardian, or, if they have no legal guardian, to such other person to expend for them as the Retirement Board may direct. Any monthly payments made to any surviving widow shall cease upon her death or remarriage, and any such payment or portion therefore due any child shall cease upon the date when she or he ceases to qualify for such payment in accordance with the requirements herein before provided, and such portion of such payment shall be divided equally among the remaining eligible children, if any.

Section 2. The term "Employee" shall mean a full-time active bargaining unit member in the service of the Town of East Hartford's Fire Department.¹

Section 3. The term "Retired Employee" shall mean a former Employee continuously employed by the Employer until the commencement of a Pension who meets the requirements to receive a Normal or Disability pension from the Employer and who is receiving a Pension provided for hereunder.

¹ "Employee" shall also include the Fire Chief and Assistant Chiefs currently serving in such position as of September 29, 2006.

Section 4. The term "Employer" shall mean the Town of East Hartford.

Section 5. The term "Plan Year" shall mean the 12 months from July 1st of any year to June 30th of the following year, both dates inclusive.

Section 6.

- (a) For Employees hired before December 31, 1994, "Final Average Salary" shall mean the Employees' average annual pay, including overtime, holiday, longevity payments, and vacation pay for the 36 consecutive months of service based upon the Plan Year with the Employer which gives the highest average. Final Average Salary shall also include any deferred salary or deferred wages that are considered annual salary or pay/wages during the period used to determine Final Average Salary. In addition, Final Average Salary shall also include any lump sum resulting from unused accrued terminal/sick leave and unused vacation subject to the maximums contained in the collective bargaining agreement.
- (b) For Employees hired after January 1, 1995, "Final Average Salary" shall mean the Employees' average annual pay, including overtime, holiday, longevity payments, and vacation pay for the 36 consecutive months of service based upon the Plan Year, with the Employer which gives the highest average. "Final Average Salary" shall also include any deferred salary or deferred wages that are considered annual salary or pay/wages during the period used to determine "Final Average Salary".

Section 7. The effective date of the Retirement System was originated by the State Legislature on June 27, 1941; however, as used hereafter, the term "Effective Date" shall mean July 1, 2005 **2015**.

Section 8. The term "Insurance Company" shall mean the Aetna Life Insurance Company, or any legal reserve life insurance company organized or incorporated under the laws of any one of the United States of America and duly licensed in the State of Connecticut.

Section 9. The term "Interest" shall mean interest at the rate determined from time to time by the Retirement Board, and shall be substantially that which is earned net after expenses on the Retirement Fund, compounded annually on the last day of the Plan Year.

Section 10. The term "Permanently and Totally Disabled" shall mean that an Employee is physically or mentally unable, as a result of bodily injury or disease, to engage in or perform the regular duties of any position in the Fire Department, and such disability was not the result of the Employee's own willful misconduct and will be permanent and continuous for the remainder of his life. For the purposes of this Retirement System, willful misconduct shall be construed to include, but is not limited to, the following events:

- (a) disability resulting from an intentionally self-inflicted injury.

- (b) disability which was contracted, suffered or incurred while the Employee was engaged in or resulted from having engaged in a felonious enterprise.

Further, no disability benefits will be payable if such disability results from service in the Armed Forces of any country for which a service connected government disability is payable.

Section 11. The term "Retirement Fund" shall mean the fund derived from contributions made as herein provided for the payment of Pension benefits to Retired Employees under this Retirement System.

Section 12. The term "Retirement Board" shall mean the Board herein created for the administration of the Retirement System. The Board shall consist of 5 members, not more than 3 of whom shall belong to any one political party as follows: A member of the Town Council; the Town Treasurer; and 3 citizens of the Town of East Hartford, 1 of whom shall be a member of the Retirement System as selected by a coalition of the various bargaining groups of the Town. All members, except the Town Treasurer, shall be appointed by the Mayor, with the consent of the Town Council. The Town Treasurer and the member representing the Town Council shall be appointed for a term of 2 years; the other 3 members shall be appointed for terms of 5 years, and their respective successors shall be appointed for 5 year terms; provided, the term of office of each member shall continue until his successor shall be appointed and shall have qualified. In the event of a vacancy on said Board, such vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as the member so to be succeeded was appointed or elected. In no event shall any person remain a member of said Board except during the time he continues to be a member of the Board or body from which he was appointed or elected. The members of the Retirement Board shall serve without compensation. The Board shall make bylaws and regulations not inconsistent with the law; shall employ such actuarial, medical, clerical and other services as may be necessary for the proper operation of the Retirement System and shall do all things necessary and proper toward carrying out the purpose for which the Retirement System was created. The Board shall submit annually to the Town Council a schedule of its estimated expenses necessary for the administration of this Retirement System, and all such expenses of administration shall be paid by the Town. The Board shall be the Trustee of the funds herein created and shall have full control and management thereof, with power to invest and reinvest the same in accordance with the laws of the state governing the investment of trust funds. The Retirement Board may enter into a group annuity contract with any insurance company authorized to transact business in the State of Connecticut to insure the entire Retirement Plan or such portion thereof as the Board shall deem advisable; provided, any such contract, before actually being consummated, shall be approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Town Council.

Section 13. The term "Retirement System" shall mean the plan of retirement and other benefits for Employees of the Town of East Hartford as set forth in and by this document and all subsequent amendments thereto.

Section 14. The term "Pension or Pensions" shall mean a payment made to a Retired Employee or his Dependent according to the provision of this Retirement System, other than a return of

contributions with Interest.

Section 15. The term "Regular Compensation" shall mean the annual salary or wages of an Employee for services with the Town, including overtime, holiday, longevity payments and vacation pay. It shall also include any deferred salary or deferred wages that are considered annual salary or pay/wages during the period used to determine Final Average Salary.

Effective for Employees hired on or after July 1, 1996, the amount of pay, for purposes of this section shall be limited to a maximum of \$150,000 in a calendar year, or such other amount as prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury pursuant to IRC §401(a)(17). In addition, Regular Compensation shall also include, only for Employees hired on or before December 31, 1994, any lump sum resulting from unused accrued terminal/sick leave and unused vacation (subject to the maximums contained in the collective bargaining agreements) when these items are included in the definition of Final Average Salary.

Section 16. The term "Service Connected Benefit" shall mean any benefit payable upon the death or disability of an Employee who dies or becomes disabled during the performance of essential duties pertaining to his employment by the Town.

Section 17. The term "Non-Service Connected Benefit" shall mean any benefit payable upon the death or disability of an Employee who dies or becomes disabled from causes not related to his employment by the Town.

Section 18. The term "Continuous Service" shall mean uninterrupted employment of an Employee with the Employer. Continuous Service with the Employer shall not be broken in the event of: (i) absence with the consent of the Retirement Board during any period not in excess of one year, except that the Retirement Board may consent to extend the period of leave; or (ii) absence from work because of occupational injury or disease incurred as a result of employment with the Employer, for which absence an Employee shall be entitled to Workers' Compensation payments.

In interpreting this section, the Employer will apply uniform rules in a like manner to all Employees under similar circumstances.

An Employee shall not receive Credited Service in the case of the period of absence set forth in (i) of the above section, but shall retain Credited Service accrued prior to such absence. Upon return to employment after an approved absence, the Employee will again accrue Credited Service.

- (1) Military Service. The Retirement Plan will grant Credited Service and years of vesting service in accordance with the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act of 1994 (USERRA) for a Participant who was an Employee immediately before the commencement of military service as defined in USERRA, provided such Participant returns to employment with the Town within the "Required Period" of time set forth in paragraphs (2)(A) through (D) below. Credited Service shall only be granted if the Participant fulfills

the requirements of paragraph (3) below.

- (2) Required Period. Under USERRA, the “Required Period” depends on the length of Military Service. In general, the Required Period is:
 - (A) one day after a Participant’s Military Service ends (if such service was less than 31 days);
 - (B) 14 days after a Participant’s Military Service ends (if such service was more than 30, but less than 181 days); and
 - (C) 90 days after a participant’s Military Service ends (if such service was more than 180 days).
 - (D) If a Participant is hospitalized for or recovering from an illness or injury that was incurred or aggravated during Military Service, USERRA requires that such Participant register for reemployment with the Town as soon as he has recovered. Except as otherwise provided by USERRA, this recovery period cannot exceed two years.
- (3) A Participant who enters the Armed Forces of the United States for a period of not more than five years (consecutive or individual years), is separated from active duty under conditions other than a dishonorable discharge, and returns to or makes himself available for work within the period specified in (2)(A)-(D), shall be granted not to exceed one year of Credited Service for vesting purposes only in any one Calendar Year, up to a maximum of five years of Credited Service for vesting purposes, for such active duty in the Armed Forces.
- (4) A Participant returning from military service who meets the requirements of (1)-(2) shall have the right to make up his Employee Contributions and thereby receive Credited Service for benefit accrual purposes equal to his period of military service, to a maximum of five years of Credited Service. Such Participant must notify the Retirement Board upon reemployment of his desire to repay his Employee Contributions. Such Contributions shall be made either in a lump sum payment or on a post-tax basis over a period equal to the lesser of (1) three times his military service or (2) five years. The amount of Employee Contributions owed to the Plan shall be equal to—
 - (A) the Employee contribution rate in effect immediately before the commencement of military service, multiplied by
 - (B) the Employee’s Regular Compensation for the preceding 12- month period prior to his military service, multiplied by
 - (C) the number of years and months of military service, to a maximum of five years; plus
 - (D) compounded interest at the rate of four (4%) percent annually.
- (5) To the extent required by USERRA, a Participant must inform the Town in writing before entering Military Service to be eligible for years of Credited Service for vesting purposes as described above.

Section 19. The term "Credited Service" shall mean the number of full years of Continuous Service and fractions thereof to the nearest completed month with the Employer, as determined by the Retirement Board, completed by the Employee from the date he is included in the Retirement System, as determined in Article III hereof, to the earlier of his date of termination of employment, or his actual retirement date. An Employee will not receive Credited Service for any period for which he is eligible hereunder if he does not make the necessary Employee contributions as described below in Article II.

A Participant may purchase additional years of Credited Service for military service that commenced prior to his employment with the Town as follows:

- (a) Military Service Buyback – Prior to Commencement of Employment with the Town. An Employee may purchase up to four (4) years of military service, defined as active duty service for the United States Government that occurred prior to his commencement of employment with the Town.
 - (1) The cost to purchase such Credited Service shall be 13% of the annual base salary at the time of the request.
- (b) The following terms and conditions shall apply to such purchase:
 - (1) There will be three (3) window periods within which a member may purchase military service time:
 - (A) Within ninety (90) calendar days of initial date of hire;
 - (B) Within ninety (90) calendar days from his date of vesting; or
 - (C) Within ninety (90) calendar days from the Town Council ratification of this signed agreement
 - (2) The purchased military leave cannot be used to establish a vested right to a pension benefit nor may it be used to establish eligibility for a Normal Retirement Pension.
 - (3) A participant may elect to pay the total cost of the purchased military leave time over three (3) years from his/her election to purchase time.
 - (4) Payroll contributions shall be made on a pre-tax basis. Direct payment to the Town shall be treated as post-tax contributions.
- (c) In the event that a Participant who has purchased military service under this provision terminates employment with the Town prior to attaining Vested Status, or dies, a return of all of his contributions attributable to the purchase of such military service shall be returned to him, or his beneficiary, with interest in accordance with the current rate specified in the Plan.

Section 20. The term "Actuary" shall mean a member of the Society of Actuaries, or an organization

employing such a member, appointed and compensated by the Retirement Board to render actuarial services with respect to the Retirement System.

Section 21. The term "Vested Employee" shall mean any former Employee who terminates employment and who subsequently qualifies for a deferred Pension under Article VII, Section 2 of this Retirement Plan.

ARTICLE II - CONTRIBUTIONS

Section 1. Contributions of Employees – Effective upon the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the rate of contribution to be made by each Employee shall equal ~~eight percent (8%)~~ nine percent (9%) of his Regular Compensation, ~~beginning as soon as practicable after Town Council ratification of this agreement~~. Such employee contribution will cease to be contributed at the end of the Plan Year when the allowable maximum pension benefit amount is attained as defined in Article IV, Section 4 of the Retirement Plan.

Effective July 1, 1999, pursuant to the provisions of Section 414(h)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, the Employer shall pick-up and pay the contributions which would otherwise be payable under this Section by each Employee for Service on and after July 1, 1999. The contributions so picked-up shall be treated as Employer contributions for purposes of determining the amounts of federal and state income taxes to be withheld from each Employee's Regular Compensation.

The Employee's contributions picked-up by the Employer shall be paid from the same source of funds used for the payment of compensation to Employees. Each Employee's Regular Compensation shall be reduced by an amount equal to the amount of the Employee's Contributions picked-up by the Employer. The contributions picked-up by the Employer shall be deposited by the Employer into the Plan.

Employee Contributions picked-up by the Employer shall be credited to a separate account within each Employee's individual contribution account, so that amounts contributed by the Employee before July 1, 1999 may be distinguished from the Employee's Contributions picked-up by the Employer on and after July 1, 1999.

Section 2. Contributions of the Employer - The Retirement Board shall, at least once every 2 years, be required to have an actuarial valuation by an Actuary of the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System and of the required contributions from the Employer which, in addition to contributions of the Employees, will be adequate to finance the benefits under the Retirement System.

On the basis of each such valuation, the Employer shall pay each year to the Retirement Board an amount which will meet the actuarial cost of current service and, until it is amortized, the unfunded accrued liability. The annual appropriation by the Employer for each of the 25 Plan Years, beginning October 1, 1987, shall be the sum of the normal cost for the year and the annual payment that would

be required, on a level basis, to amortize the unfunded accrued liability over 25 years from October 1, 1987. The appropriation for each Plan Year thereafter shall be the normal cost for the year.

Any proposal which will change the benefits payable or Employee contributions required under the Retirement System shall be accompanied by an estimate by the Actuary of the additional appropriations by the Employer which will be required to finance the additional normal cost and to amortize, on a level basis, the additional accrued liability over 30 years from the effective date of the change.

ARTICLE III - ELIGIBILITY

Section 1. An Employee who was an eligible Employee in the Retirement System on July 1, 2005 2015, will remain an eligible Employee thereafter, subject to the provisions of this Retirement System.

Section 2. An Employee who enters the service of the Employer on or after July 1, 2005 2015 will become an eligible Employee if the following conditions are met:

- (a) under age 45 - as a condition of employment, it is mandatory that an Employee becomes covered under the Retirement System within 3 months after his employment commences.
- (b) he has reached his 45th birthday - as a condition of employment, it is not mandatory that an Employee becomes covered under the Retirement System; however, he must apply within 3 months of entering the service of the Town. If such Employee does not apply then, he must do so within 2 years of his employment date, and in order to be credited with such service, he must pay all back contributions with Interest thereon.
- (c) All Employees must make their required Employee contributions while eligible to do so. No credit will be granted during any period when the Employee does not make the necessary contributions to the Retirement System.

ARTICLE IV - AMOUNT OF PENSION

Section 1. Subject to the maximum and minimum limitations herein set forth, the Retirement Board shall pay to each Employee who has retired in accordance with Article VI, a Normal Retirement Pension for life. The yearly amount of such Pension will equal two and one-half percent (2.5%) of his Final Average Salary multiplied by the number of years of his Credited Service with the Employer as a Firefighter an employee of the fire department. For all employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the yearly amount of such Pension will equal two and thirty-three one hundredths percent (2.33%) of his/her Final Average Salary multiplied by the number of years of his Credited Service with the Employer as an employee of the fire department. One-twelfth (1/12) of this amount will be paid monthly.

Section 2. Current Employees as of the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, who physically retire after the effective date of this Agreement shall receive a cost-of-living adjustment of one percent (1%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the fifth (5th) calendar year after the calendar year in which a participant retires. The cost-of-living adjustment will be increased to two percent (2%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the ninth (9th) year of actual retirement. All employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1 shall receive a cost-of-living adjustment of one percent (1%) per annum beginning on the July 1st in the seventh (7th) calendar year after the calendar year in which a participant retires.

Section 3. The minimum monthly Pension for an Employee who retires on or after the Effective Date on his Normal Retirement Date, in accordance with Article VI, will equal one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) per month.

Section 4. For current employees as of the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the maximum yearly Pension for an Employee who retires under this Retirement System will equal seventy-five percent (75%) of his Final Average Salary as defined in Article I, Sections 6a and 6b. For all employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, the maximum yearly Pension for an Employee who retires under this Retirement System will not exceed one-hundred percent (100%) of the employee's base salary at the time of retirement. For purposes of this Section only – for all employees hired on or after the date of the Interest Arbitration Award in Case No. 2016-MBA-1, base pay shall mean the salary applicable to the employee's classification and labor grade step at the time of retirement plus any annual stipends or payments including, but not limited to, annual holiday pay and paramedic stipend as specified in the Contract between the Town and the Union.

Section 4.01 In General

This Retirement Plan shall follow the requirements of IRC §415 as applicable to government plans within the meaning of IRC §414(d).

Section 4.02. Annual Benefit.

The Annual Benefit of a Participant hereunder (adjusted to an Actuarially Equivalent straight life annuity as defined in Section 4.05(d) shall not at any time within the Limitation Year exceed the lesser of—

- (a) \$90,000, as that amount shall be adjusted from time to time, or
 - (b) 100 percent of the Participant's average Compensation for his high 3 years
- Effective July 1, 1995, subsection (b) shall not apply.

Section 4.03. Adjustment for Less than 10 Years of Participation.

- (a) In the case of a Participant who has less than 10 years of participation in this Plan, the \$90,000 limitation set forth in Section 4.02 shall be multiplied by a fraction, the numerator of which is years of participation in this Plan and the denominator of which is 10. This shall also apply to the Compensation limitation in Section 4.02 except that the numerator shall be years of service with the Town rather than years of participation in this Plan.
- (b) The limitations of section 4.03(a), above, however, do not apply if the Pension amounts do not exceed \$10,000 for the current or prior Plan Year and the Participant has not been covered at any time by a defined contribution plan to which the Town contributed on his or her behalf.

Section 4.04. Maximum Benefit Limitation Definitions.

For purposes of this Article XII, the following definitions shall apply:

- (a) "Pension" shall mean an annual benefit payable at Normal Retirement Age as a straight life annuity with no ancillary benefits or an annuity payable in a joint and survivor payment form where the Participant's spouse is the Joint Pensioner. A benefit payable in any other form shall be converted to the actuarial equivalent of a straight life annuity, for purposes of applying these limits, based on a five percent (5%) interest assumption. Other required adjustments are provided for below.
- (b) "Compensation" shall mean all earnings reported on W-2 forms completed by the Town in respect to the Plan Year specified.
- (c) "Annual Benefit" shall mean the benefit to which the Participant would be entitled to at his or her Normal Retirement Date assuming he or she continues employment until such date and

that all other relevant facts used to determine benefits under the Plan remain constant as of the current Limitation Year for all future Limitation Years.

- (d) The term “Limitation Year” shall mean a Plan Year.
- (e) The term “Qualified Participant” shall mean that term as defined in Section 4.05, below.

Section 4.05 Adjustment for Early or Late Commencement of Benefits.

- (a) In General. If the annual pension benefit of a Participant begins before age 62, as described in IRC §415(b)(8) the \$90,000 limitation set forth in Section 4.02, above shall be reduced so that it is equivalent to such a benefit beginning at age 62. The reduction of this paragraph shall not reduce the limitation of Section 4.05(a), below—
 - (1) \$75,000 if the benefit begins at or after age 55, or
if the benefit begins before age 55, the equivalent of the \$75,000 limitation for age 55.
- (b) In the case of a “qualified Member”, the limitations of Section 4.05(a) shall not apply. A qualified Member means a Member:
 - (1) in a defined benefit plan which is maintained by a State or political subdivision therefore; and
 - (2) with respect to whom the period of service taken into account in determining the amount of the benefit under such defined benefit plan includes at least 15 years of service of the Member; and
 - (3) is a full-time employee of any police department or fire department which is organized and operated by the State or political subdivision maintaining such defined benefit plan to provide police protection, firefighting services for any area within the jurisdiction of such State or political subdivision; or
 - (4) is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (c) Benefits Beginning after Age 55. If the annual pension benefit of a Participant begins after age 65, the \$90,000 limitation set forth in 4.02 above shall be increased so that it is equivalent to such a benefit beginning at age 65.
- (d) Actuarial Equivalence. Actuarial Equivalence under this Section 4.05 shall be determined using a five percent (5%) interest assumption, and the term “\$90,000” shall include any higher amounts prescribed pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code for purposes of these limitations.
- (e) In the case of disability or survivor benefits provided under the Plan, the limitations of Section 4.03(a) and 4.05(a) shall not apply to:
 - (1) income received from the Plan as a pension, annuity, or similar Pension as the result

of the recipient becoming disabled by reason of personal injuries or sickness, or

(2) amounts received from a governmental plan by the beneficiaries, survivors or the estate of an Employee as the result of the death of the Employee.

Section 4.06 Combined Plan Limits.

- (a) If a Participant also participates in another defined benefit plan of the Town obligated to contribute under this Plan, and such Plan is a qualified plan under IRC §401(a), such plan shall be combined with this Plan in accordance with Treas. Reg. §1.415-8(e) for purposes of determining compliance with the limitations of IRC §415(b).
- (b) If a Participant also participates in a defined contribution plan of the Town obligated to contribute under this Plan, and such Plan is a qualified plan under IRC §401(a), such plan will be combined with this Plan in accordance with Treas. Reg. §1.415-8(e) for purposes of determining compliance with the limitations under IRC §415(e).
- (c) Effective for Limitation Years beginning on and after July 1, 2000, Section 4.06(b) shall no longer apply.

Section 4.07 Protection of Prior Benefits.

For any year before 1986, the limitations prescribed by IRC §415 as in effect before enactment of the Tax Reform Act of 1986 and all subsequent legislation shall apply, and no Pension earned under this Retirement Plan prior to 1986 shall be reduced on account of the provisions of Sections 4.03 through 4.08 if it would have satisfied those limitations under that prior law.

Section 4.08 Application of Maximum Limitations.

- (a) The benefit paid under this Retirement Plan shall not exceed the limitations set forth in Section 4.02.
- (b) If a Participant on his or her annuity starting date is not eligible for full monthly benefits under this Retirement Plan because of the operation of Section 4.02, the monthly benefit thereafter shall be recalculated annually until the Participant is receiving a full monthly benefit under the Retirement Plan's terms without the operation of this Section 4.08. Each such recalculation shall be based on this Section 4.08 with any applicable adjustment to reflect cost of living increases as permitted by the Treasury Regulations.

Section 5. The amount of Pension to be provided for a terminated Employee who has met the vesting requirement in Section 2 of Article VII will be the amount of Pension accrued to the date of his termination using Final Average Salary and Credited Service to such date. Such Pension shall be based on the Retirement Plan provisions in effect at the time the Employee terminated his Employment with his Employer.

ARTICLE V - DISABILITY PAYMENTS

Section 1. An Employee shall be deemed to be Permanently and Totally Disabled within the meaning of this Retirement System only if the Retirement Board, in its sole and absolute discretion, shall determine on the basis of medical evidence that the Employee is Permanently and Totally Disabled.

Section 2. Employees applying for disability retirement shall be required to submit to examination, at the expense of the Retirement Board, by at least 2 impartial physicians or psychiatrists selected by the Retirement Board, and such Employees may be required to submit to re-examination no more than once in each 12 month period. Should the results of such examination indicate that an Employee retired on account of a disability, is physically and mentally able to perform the regular duties required of such Employee, then such Employee, at the option of the Retirement Board, may remain retired or may be returned to duty at the same rank held by such Employee at the time of his disability retirement and, upon returning to duty, such Employee will be credited with all service time for the period of his disability retirement, provided he makes payment of the amount he would have been required to contribute to the Retirement System during the period of his disability, with Interest thereon. All presently disabled Employees of the Fire Department shall be governed by the foregoing.

Section 3. Service Connected Disability - Any Employee covered under this Retirement System who becomes Permanently and Totally Disabled during the performance of essential duties pertaining to his employment shall be eligible to retire and receive a Service Connected Disability Pension equal to fifty percent (50%) of the disabled Employee's Final Average Salary or his annual rate of Regular Compensation at the time of such disability (whichever is greater) if the Employee has completed less than 20 years of Credited Service. If the Employee has completed 20 or more years of Credited Service at his date of disability, the amount of the Service Connected Disability Pension shall be determined in the same manner as his Normal Pension as described in Article IV, Section 1 hereof using Credited Service and Final Average Salary or Regular Compensation as of the date of disability. In no event shall payments under this section, together with any benefits awarded under the Connecticut Workers' Compensation Act, exceed one hundred percent (100%) of the Final Average Salary or the Regular Compensation being paid to the disabled Employee at the time of his disability.

Section 4. Non-Service Connected Disability - Any actively employed Employee under this Retirement System who has 5 years of Credited Service and becomes Permanently and Totally Disabled shall be eligible to retire and receive a Non-Service Connected Disability Pension. The amount of such Non-Service Connected Disability Pension shall be equal to the disabled Employee's accrued benefit at the time of such disability as determined in the same manner as his Normal Pension as described in Article IV, Section 1, but based on Credited Service to the date of his disability subject to a minimum of twenty percent (20%) of his Final Average Salary.

Section 5. Cessation of Disability - Such disability payments will end immediately on the date the Employee ceases to be Permanently and Totally Disabled by death or recovery.

ARTICLE VI - RETIREMENT DATE

Section 1. The Normal Retirement Date of an Employee is the day of the month named by the Employee on which he has completed 25 years of Credited Service with the Employer.

Section 2. An Employee will not be permitted to work as a full-time permanent Employee of the Town after he has reached his 65th birthday. An Employee who reaches his 65th birthday before completing 25 years of Credited Service with the Employer will be eligible to retire when he reaches his 65th birthday, provided he has completed at least 10 years of Credited Service. Such Employee's Pension shall be determined as provided in Article IV, Section 1. All Pension payments shall become due and payable on the last day of each calendar month, provided the initial Pension payment shall be computed as the pro rata of the amount of Pension corresponding to the fraction of the month elapsed since the effective date of retirement.

Section 3. If a Retired Employee is re-employed by the Employer, his Pension shall cease with the last payment due prior to his re-employment. Pension payments shall again become payable following subsequent termination of employment.

ARTICLE VII - TERMINATION OF SERVICE

Section 1. An Employee who terminates employment before he has completed at least 10 years of Credited Service with the Employer will lose his eligibility for Retirement System benefits, and he will receive his Employee contributions with Interest up to his date of termination of employment.

Section 2. An Employee who has completed at least 10 years of Credited Service and who does not elect to receive his Employee contributions with Interest may elect to receive a Pension equal to the amount determined from Section 1 and 5 of Article IV. The Pension will be provided when the terminated Employee would have normally been eligible to retire as determined in Section 1 of Article VI had he continued in employment with the Employer rather than terminated his employment. Terminated vested Employees who die before or after retirement will receive a Death Benefit, as determined in Section 4 of Article VIII, namely, the return of their contributions with Interest up to their date of death or retirement, whichever is earlier, less any Pension payments received after retirement.

Section 3. An Employee who terminates service after the completion of at least 10 years of Credited Service will not be eligible for the Non-Service Connected Disability Benefit or the Non-Service Connected Death Benefit.

ARTICLE VIII - DEATH BENEFITS

Section 1. Service Connected Death - Upon the death of an Employee who dies during the performance of essential duties pertaining to his employment, his Dependents shall receive a Service Connected Death Benefit equal to fifty percent (50%) of such deceased Employee's Final Average Salary or his annual rate of Regular Compensation (whichever is greater) if the deceased Employee had completed less than 20 years of Credited Service. If the deceased Employee had completed 20 or more years of Credited Service at his date of death, the amount of the Service Connected Death Benefit shall be determined in the same manner as his Normal Pension as described in Article IV, Section 1 hereof using Credited Service and Final Average Salary or Regular Compensation as of the date of death. This benefit will also be payable to the Dependents of an Employee who dies as a result of a Service Connected Disability Benefit, the total benefits payable under this section to the deceased Employee's Dependents during their compensable period, together with any benefits awarded under the Connecticut Workers' Compensation Act, shall not exceed one hundred percent (100%) of the Regular Compensation being paid to the deceased Employee at the time of his death.

Section 2. Non-Service Connected Death - Upon the death of an actively employed Employee who dies from causes not related to his employment with his Employer, and who has completed at least 5 years of Credited Service, his Dependents will receive a Death Benefit equal to the deceased Employee's accrued benefit at the time of his death, as determined in the same manner as his Normal Pension, as described in Article IV, Section 1 hereof, but based on Credited Service on the date of his death, subject to a minimum of twenty percent (20%) of his Final Average Salary.

Section 3. Post-Retirement Death - Upon the death of a Retired Employee, his Dependents will receive a Death Benefit equal to seventy-five (75%) of the Pension the deceased Employee was receiving at his date of death. If the Retired Employee and his Dependents should die before the total of the Retired Employee's contributions with Interest have been received by the Retired Employee and his Dependents, the excess of such contributions and Interest will be payable to the estate of the last surviving Dependent.

Section 4. Death Benefits - No Dependents - Upon the death of a Retired Employee who has no Dependents, his beneficiary will receive a Death Benefit equal to such deceased Employee's contributions with Interest less any Pension benefits received by the Employee prior to his death. If there is no named beneficiary, any such Death Benefits will be paid to the estate of the deceased Employee.

Section 5. Beneficiaries - An Employee may name a beneficiary to receive the Death Benefit due on or after his death, as described in Section 4 above, by written request filed with the Employer. With the consent of the Employer, he may name 2 or more co-beneficiaries or successor beneficiaries. If an Employee names 2 or more persons as beneficiaries, such persons or their survivors will be considered co-beneficiaries unless he provides otherwise. An Employee may change any named beneficiary from time to time by written request filed with the Employer. The consent of his beneficiary is not required to any naming or change thereof. Such request is effective

when the Employee signs it whether or not he is living at the time the request is received by the Town, but without prejudice for any payments made before receipt of the request.

ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENT TO THE RETIREMENT SYSTEM

Section 1. This Retirement System is established and maintained for the exclusive benefit of Employees of the Employer and their beneficiaries. Subject to this limitation, any provisions of this Retirement System may be amended by the Employer at any time if, with respect to payments resulting from Pensions provided before the effective date of the amendment, the amendment does not reduce the amount of any payment, or the term of monthly payments, or delay the due date of any payment.

Section 2. Any provision of this Retirement System may be amended in any respect, without regard to the above limitation, if the amendment is required for qualification or continued qualification of the Retirement System under income tax law, or is necessary for this Retirement System to meet the requirements of any other applicable law.

Section 3. Neither the consent of the Employee nor that of any other payee is required for any amendment to the Retirement System made as provided above.

ARTICLE X - ADMINISTRATION OF PLAN

Section 1. Annual Report. The Retirement Board shall, on or before March 31st of each year, file with the Town Council an Annual Report showing the financial condition of the Retirement System as of the end of the last completed fiscal year, including an actuarial valuation of assets and liabilities, and setting forth such other facts, recommendations and data as may be of value to the members of the Retirement System of the Town of East Hartford.

Section 2. If there shall arise any misunderstanding or ambiguity concerning the meaning of any of the provisions of the Retirement System, the Retirement Board shall have the sole right to construe such provisions, and the Retirement Board's decision shall be final. The Retirement Board may establish such rules and regulations supplementing the Retirement System as it considers desirable.

Section 3. The finding of facts by the Retirement board as to matters relating to an Employee's employment record are binding on him for the purposes of the Retirement System. The Retirement System shall confer no right upon any Employee to be retained as an Employee by the Employer.

Section 4. All persons shall promptly furnish information and proofs to the Retirement Board as to any and all facts which the Retirement Board may reasonably require concerning any person affected by the terms of the Retirement System (including date of birth and satisfactory proof, by

personal endorsement of the pension checks or otherwise, of the survival of any payee to the due date of any pension payment).

Section 5. Each Employee who has terminated service with the Employer and who has met the vesting requirements in accordance with Article VII, will inform the Retirement Board of his changes of address. Such terminated Employees must inform the Retirement Board of their desire to retire and must make an appropriate application. All notices to any person from the Retirement Board will be sent to the last address of such person which the Retirement Board has on record, and the Retirement Board has no further obligation to such person in the event any such communication, sent by registered or certified mail, is not received by the person.

Section 6. If any fact relating to an Employee or any other payee has been misstated, the correct fact may be used to determine the amount of Pension payable to him or such other payee. If overpayments or underpayments have been made because of such incorrect statement, the amount of any future payments may be appropriately adjusted.

ARTICLE XI - GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. An application for a Pension must be made in writing on a form and in a manner prescribed by the Retirement Board and shall be filed with the Retirement Board at least 2 months in advance of the final month for which benefits are payable.

Section 2. A single sum payment in an actuarially equivalent amount may be made in lieu of monthly payments if the amount of each monthly Pension payment would be less than \$20.00.

Section 3. No payee may sell, assign, discount, or pledge as collateral for a loan or as a security for the performance of an obligation or for any other purpose, any payment due to him. If the payee for any payment is a minor or incompetent person, payment may be made to the person, or persons, caring for or supporting such payee, in full discharge of all obligations, as determined by the Retirement Board.

Section 4. There will be no obligation to make any payment to a payee herein unless the payer has received proof that the payee was living on the due date of the payment. If such proof is not received within 7 years after the due date of the payment, and if no proof of the death of the payee is received during such 7 year period, the obligations of the payer as to the payment and as to the Pension payments, if any, from which the payments results will be the same as if the payee had died immediately before the due date of the payment.

Section 5. The use of the singular herein shall be deemed to include the plural, the use of the plural shall include the singular, and all references to gender shall be interchangeable where the context so requires.

Section 6. In no event will any Employee receive at retirement anything less than what he would have received under the provisions of this Plan as constituted prior to July 1, ~~2005~~ 2015, as a result of this plan amendment.

ARTICLE XII - DURATION OF AGREEMENT

Either party may request the other party, in writing, to meet for the purpose of negotiating changes in the Town's Retirement Plan, to take effect no sooner than January 1, ~~2015~~ 2020, unless an earlier date is mutually agreed in writing.

The signature lines have been omitted from this Agreement as this Agreement represents the Arbitration Panel's Award in Case. No. 2016-MBA-1 which was issued on May 18, 2017.

The Parties agree that this document is a best effort to accurately reflect the arbitration award issued by the arbitration panel in case number 2016-MBA-1. Any dispute as to accuracy or content of this document shall be governed by the Agreed Language document and the Award on the Issues in Dispute in the above referenced case.

ARTICLE XIII - ROLLOVER PROVISIONS

Section 1.1 Direct Rollovers

This section applies to distributions made on or after July 1, 1993. Notwithstanding any provisions of the Plan to the contrary that would otherwise limit a Distributee's election under this Section, a Distributee may elect, at the time and in the manner prescribed by the Retirement Board in accordance with applicable regulations, to have any portion of an Eligible Rollover Distribution paid directly to an Eligible Retirement Plan specified by the Distributee in a Direct Rollover.

- (a) A Distributee who is entitled to elect a Direct Rollover with respect to all or any portion of a distribution, but who does not make any election shall be deemed to have rejected the Direct Rollover option.
- (b) A Distributee who elects a Direct Rollover with respect to any Eligible Rollover Distribution that is one in a series of installment payments made at least annually over a period of less than 10 years shall be deemed to have made the same election with respect to all subsequent Eligible Rollover Distributions in the series unless and until the Distributee changes the election. A change of election shall be accomplished by notifying the Retirement Board of the change in the form and manner prescribed by the Retirement Board.
- (c) Within a reasonable period of time before an Eligible Rollover Distribution is to be made, the Retirement Board shall provide to the Distributee an explanation of the right to elect a

Direct Rollover and the federal tax withholding consequences of failing to elect a Direct Rollover. A Distributee who elects a Direct Rollover must provide all information that the Retirement Board may require to complete the Direct Rollover.

(d) For the purposes of this Section, the following definitions shall apply:

(1) An “Eligible Rollover Distribution” is any distribution of all or any portion of the balance of the credit of the Distributee, except that an Eligible Rollover Distribution does not include: any distribution that is one of a series of substantially equal periodic payments (at least annually) made for the life (of the life expectancy) of the Distributee or the joint lives (of joint life expectancies) of the Distributee and the Distributee’s designated beneficiary, or for a specific period of ten years or more; any distribution to the extent such distribution is required under Section 401(a)(9) of the Code; and the portion of any distribution that is not includable in gross income (determined without regard to the exclusion for net unrealized appreciation with respect to employer securities).

(2) A distribution of less than \$200 that would otherwise be an Eligible Rollover Distribution within the meaning of paragraph (d-1) shall not be an Eligible Rollover Distribution if it is reasonable to expect that all such distributions to the Distributee from the Plan during the same calendar year will total less than \$200.

(3) An “Eligible Retirement Plan” is an individual retirement account described in Section 408(a) of the Code, an individual retirement annuity described in Section 408(b) of the Code or a qualified trust described in Section 401(a) of the Code, that accepts the Distributee’s Eligible Rollover Distribution. However, in the case of an Eligible Rollover Distribution to the surviving spouse, an Eligible Retirement Plan is an individual retirement account or individual retirement annuity.

(4) “Distributee” includes a Town or former Employee. In addition, the Employee’s or former Employee’s surviving spouse and the Employee’s or former Employee’s spouse or former spouse who is the alternate payee under a qualified domestic relations order, as defined in Section 414(p) of the Code, are Distributees with regard to the interest of the spouse or former spouse.

(5) A “Direct Rollover” is a payment by the Plan to the Eligible Retirement Plan specified by the Distributee.

Section 1.2 Rollovers to the Plan

In no event shall the Plan accept Eligible Rollovers from any source unless a reemployed Employee is making a repayment of his Employee Contributions.

ARTICLE XIV – Deferred Retirement Option Plan (DROP) / PARTIAL LUMP SUM OPTION (PLUS)

Section 1. The Deferred Retirement Option Plan will be offered only to employees employed on or after July 1, 2005. The DROP is intended to provide an alternative retirement option to employees who are eligible to retire. The Town and Local #1548 agree that the DROP and PLUS options are considered to be cost-neutral as confirmed by the Town's actuary (Segal Company).

Section 2. An employee, who is a member of the Retirement Plan for full-time employees of the Fire Department of the Town of East Hartford, upon completing his/her 25th year of Credited Service may elect the DROP at anytime up to and through the completion of his/her 29th year of Credited Service. The employee must provide the Town with at least 60 days advanced notice, in writing, that he/she has elected the DROP. No employees may elect the DROP after completion of his/her 29th year of Credited Service.

Section 3. Any employees electing DROP will be considered retired with respect to the Pension Plan but will not have separated from Town service. Notwithstanding any other provision within the Retirement Plan to the contrary, a member does not need to leave Town service to qualify for pension benefits as long as that member has elected DROP. The employees who have elected the DROP may remain in Town service at their current rank, with all the benefits of their Collective Bargaining Agreement, including promotional opportunities, through and including the completion of their DROP period.

Section 4. The DROP period is defined as the time after the employees have elected the DROP commencing on the date of the first payment to the DROP through the date that the member separates from Town service.

Section 5. No further pension benefits will accrue after the DROP effective date.

Section 6. When employees elect the DROP they will be entitled to all the benefits they would have received under the Normal Retirement provisions of the Retirement Plan (during the DROP period) with the following exceptions:

- (a) During the DROP period the employee's monthly pension payments will be made to the employee's separately designated DROP account established for the benefit of that member. During the DROP period, the monthly pension payments will be 96% of the monthly pension payment the employee was entitled to receive had the member retired without electing the DROP. Upon separation from Town service, the monthly pension payment shall increase to 100% of the monthly pension, as though the member had retired and not elected the DROP.

- (b) During the DROP period, the employees will continue to make the same employee contributions from earnings while employed with the Town as was in effect at the time the DROP was elected by such employee. These contributions are made to the pension fund, not the member's separate DROP plan account.
- (c) Commencement of the COLA waiting period is the date the employee physically separates from Town service, not the DROP date.

Section 7. Any member who has elected and commenced the DROP may not withdraw unless:

- (a) the member separates from Town service (see Section 9); or
- (b) the member applies in writing to the Retirement Board to seek permission to be released/withdraw from the DROP election and the Retirement Board grants that request, which decision will be final.

Section 8. The minimum length of DROP will be one (1) year and the maximum length of the DROP will be five (5) years. Upon electing the DROP the employees will select the length of his/her respective DROP. Military time purchased by a member shall be included in the calculation of the member's pension benefit under the Retirement Plan. (For example, an employee who has completed his 25th year of service may elect the DROP and purchase two (2) years of military service and, if so, shall receive credit for 27 years of service.) Under no circumstances will an employee be credited with more than 30 years of service.

Section 9. Any member who has elected the DROP may separate from Town service at anytime during the DROP period and such separation will mark the termination of the DROP period and the commencement of Normal Pension benefits at 100%. The maximum length of Town service for any member who has elected the DROP is defined as the completion of the 30th year of Credited Service. No member will be allowed to continue Town service after the completion of the 30th year of service.

Section 10. The Town has selected an Administrator through the Ordinance Bidding process to custody the funds for all members who elect the DROP. The choice between investment vehicles offered by the administrator shall be with the member. The cost of such custody administration will be paid for by members as an account charge. Upon completion of the DROP period, the member will be considered a retired employee and will receive non-adjusted payments (100% of their Normal Retirement benefits as accrued on the DROP effective date plus a lump sum equal to the DROP accumulation). The lump sum will be made available to the employee/member within a reasonable period of time after the member terminates service with

the Town.


Section 11. When a member elects the DROP, their accrued terminal, sick and vacation leave payout will be included in the calculations of their final average salary as provided in the Retirement Plan. When the member elects the DROP the member will be paid for 50% of their contractually (the collective bargaining agreement) compensable accrued sick time at the commencement of the DROP and will be paid the remaining 50% of the accrued sick time when they separate from Town service. Sick leave accrual will be adjusted to reflect the 50% payout, leaving the other 50% of the max plus any overage. In the event insignificant accrued sick time is available to pay the remaining 50%, whatever balance is available at separation will be paid out at 50% and a corresponding retroactive adjustment to the final average salary calculation, which will impact the final pension amount paid to the retiree. Sick time in excess of any amount includable in the contractual buy-out provision shall be forfeited.

Section 12. Any member who elects the DROP shall not be eligible for the Plus Option.

Section 13. In lieu of receiving a pension in the form of an annuity, an employees may elect a Partial Lump Sum Option whereby a portion of his/her pension benefit will be paid as a lump sum benefit upon retirement from the Town. The amount of the lump shall be equal to 10% of the actuarial present value of the benefit as determined by the Plan's actuary, based upon actuarial factors in effect at the time of distribution to determine actual funding. The remaining portion of the employee's benefit shall be paid monthly for such employee's lifetime, in accordance with the Retirement Plan provisions. Upon the death of the employee, 75% of the monthly benefits that the employee was receiving shall be continued for an eligible dependent, if any, as described in the Retirement Plan.

Attached is a list of accounts I am requesting be transferred into the Suspense Rate Book. I have also attached a Collector's Certificate giving reference to this amount. It is anticipated that this list will be acted upon on the **June 6, 2017 Town Council meeting**.

I am requesting that all outstanding taxes for Personal Property, Motor Vehicle and Motor Vehicle Supplemental taxes on the 10-1-2013 Grand List be transferred into suspense. In addition, Doosan Fuel Cell America Inc. 2014 & 2015 appear on this list – connected to 2013 grand list Clearedge Power Corp and their bankruptcy filing. It has been determined by Counsel that Doosan did not acquire the fuel cells during their asset acquisition.

1. These taxes **will remain collectible** for fifteen years from the due date, but at this time we feel that it is unlikely that we will be collecting these taxes and therefore they should be removed from the books as a receivable for the Town of East Hartford. All taxes transferred into suspense will show as due and payable during any inquiry for unpaid taxes or parking tickets on our system.
2. If these taxes are transferred into suspense, the prior year taxes will then present a more realistic figure as to what is actually collectible and will be useful in any future budget considerations and bonding issues.
3. By carrying only the current year taxes plus two prior years motor vehicle taxes as open items, we are working in concert with the blockage of motor vehicle registrations and the motor vehicle department. Registrations are renewed every two years. The Department of Motor Vehicle will carry a blockage on their records for 24 months. If we are unable to collect delinquent motor vehicle taxes within that time, our chances of collecting them later are very slim.
4. We have done our very best to collect personal property taxes. In most cases, those accounts not paid are either out of business, in bankruptcy, foreclosure, moved or continue to struggle with the poor economy.
5. The act of placing these accounts in suspense in no way diminishes our efforts or impedes our ability to pursue these delinquent tax amounts.



Salary of Mayor and Registrars of Voters ordinance
(5/21/17)

Sec. 1 Section 2-3 of the ordinances of the town of East Hartford is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof:


Beginning November 14, 2007, the Mayor's salary shall be \$78,723, which is a zero increase and beginning on November 14, 2008, the Mayor's salary shall be \$81,400 which is an increase of 3.4%, representing the increase in the consumer price index for 2005. Beginning November 11, 2014 and annually thereafter, the Mayor's salary shall increase by fifty percent of the increase in the consumer price index-all urban consumers for the preceding calendar year, provided that the Mayor's salary for November 11, 2013 shall be increased by fifty percent of the consumer price index-all urban consumers for the calendar years 2006 through 2012 inclusive. Effective November 2015, the Mayor's salary will be \$90,067 which is based on the increase in the 2013 consumer price index. Effective November 2016, the Mayor's salary will be \$91,688 which is based on the increase in the 2014 consumer price index. Effective November 13, 2017, the Mayor's salary shall be \$93,522 which is an increase of 2% and effective November 1, 2018, the Mayor's salary shall be \$95,392 which is an increase of 2%.

Sec. 2 Section 2-3b of the ordinances of the town of East Hartford is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof:

Beginning on January 1, [2015] 2018, the salary for each registrar of voters shall be [~~\$23,000~~] \$25,000 and the salary for each of the deputy registrar of voters shall be \$8,000 provided: (1) the registrar of voters office shall be open to the public no less than twenty-four hours per week; (2) the registrar of voters and deputy registrar of voters shall conduct no less than four voter outreach session in locations outside of town hall annually; (3) the registrars of voters and deputy registrars of voters shall take state mandated training for such offices; (4) the registrar of voters and the deputy registrar of voters shall comply with all state election law requirements; and (5) the registrars of voters shall provide an annual written report to the mayor and town council within two months after each election which shall consist of an overview of the office's activities for the year, an appraisal of the conduct of voting process for the previous election including any primary or special elections and recommendations for improving the election process. The Town Council may reduce the salary of a registrar of voters or a deputy registrar of voters if it determines that such person violated any provision of this section.

Attached please find a copy of the amusement permit application submitted by **Riverfront Recapture by Joshua M. Urrutia, Director of Events**. The applicant seeks to conduct an outdoor concert, food and a fireworks display at **Great River Park** on **Saturday, July 8, 2017** from **7PM to the conclusion of the fireworks display which is scheduled for 9 PM to 9:30 PM**. **The concert will begin at 7 PM.**

There is a Rain date of Sunday, July 9, 2017 and that timeline will be the same as that of July 8th event.

As part of Riverfront Recapture's agreement with the Town of East Hartford, which resolution passed June 3, 2014, the applicant respectfully requests that the application fee and any associated Town expenses be waived.

Pursuant to Town Ordinance (TO) 5-3, a review of the application was completed by the Directors of the Fire, Health, Parks & Recreation, Public Works Departments and the Offices of the Corporation Counsel and Finance.

The **Offices of Corporation Counsel and Finance** approve the application as submitted.

The **Fire Department** approves the application as submitted and states the following:

- Applicant will be responsible for the cost of fire protection and EMS
- **The anticipated cost to the Department for their services is approximately \$5,000.00.**

The **Health Department** recommends approval provided that any food service license applications are submitted to the Health Department at least two (2) weeks prior to the first event. **It further states there anticipated costs to the Department, if any, are unknown at this time.**

The **Parks & Recreation Department** approves the application as submitted and states **there are no anticipated costs to the Department.**

The **Public Works Department** recommends the application be approved subject to the following conditions:

- Road closures will require permits and must be obtained from the appropriate jurisdictions.
- Traffic and detours may be limited due to ongoing CT DOT bridge rehabilitation projects in the vicinity of Route 2 and I-84. The applicant must contact the CT DOT project engineer to coordinate the event.
- **The anticipated cost to the Department is \$5,000.00.**

The **Police Department** can provide adequate police protection for this proposed event, which is a part of a larger activity known as Riverfront Fireworks. The Police Department will be developing an operations plan to address the full scope of the Riverfront Fireworks activity, to include traffic control, vehicle parking, crowd control, and emergency services. The amusement, proposed in this application, shall be included in the Department's overall response to Riverfront Fireworks.

- The predominant concerns generated by Riverfront Fireworks are vehicle parking, crowd and traffic control.
- Crowds are expected to be heavy in the areas of the proposed amusements, as these are also the prime viewing areas for the fireworks display. Access to these spectator areas will be addressed in the Riverfront Fireworks operations plan, and maintained by members of this Department. The proposed amusement would likely occupy the time and interest of crowds awaiting the fireworks display. Such a diversion is helpful to police in maintaining order.
- Traffic control, particularly in the immediate area of the Riverfront Fireworks is always a concern. This shall be addressed by the closing of streets leading to, and surrounding the Riverfront Fireworks area. These closings will occur several hours prior to the start of Riverfront Fireworks activities, to prevent the advance gathering of vehicles in the area. This will be a coordinated effort of this Department and the Connecticut State Police, who shall be closing highway off ramps leading into the area.
- In conjunction with the closing of streets, motorists will be directed to park on adjacent streets or utilize available parking lots in the City of Hartford.
- The police manpower necessary for this event far exceeds the normal patrol complement on that date. Consequently, the required personnel will be provided through overtime hiring. In past years, some area towns have provided officers to augment East Hartford's police contingent. It is probable that assistance from outside agencies will not be required this year.
- **The anticipated cost to the Department for this event is \$30,513.81.**

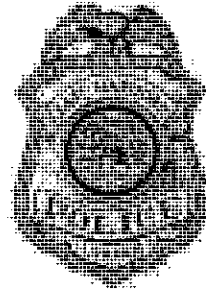

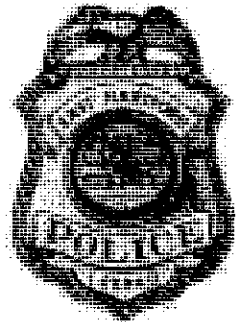

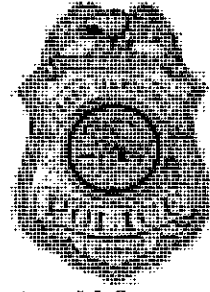
